

Doctor Salvador Allende, the late President of Chile, faced death rather than surrender to a military junta. He is a key protaganist in two films opening at the Bleecker Street Cinema on Friday evening, September 28th.

Rarely is a contemporary tragedy so accurately mirrored in art as it is in QUE HACER. Filmed in English by a United

States/Chilean film team working in Chile, QUE HACER weaves brilliant documentary coverage of the Allende election with a fast moving story of political intrigue providing filmgoers with a breakthrough in the field of political cinema. Fictional CIA agents and movie radicals move through their opposite worlds while the real leftists and rightists battle in the Chilean streets. As in life, the line between fiction and reality grows blurred. Country Joe McDonald

appears throughout the film as a sardonic Brechtean chorus

breaking cinematic illusion with a cruel realistic grin and

hard rock chords.

Le Monde called QUE HACER brilliant, committed, exciting. It won the First Critics' Prize at the Mannheim Film Festival and won rare acclaim in the French and German cinema press. From Mannheim: "Never has a film been so timely and offered so much insight into key processes of our time and into the very nature of political cinema."

Saul Landau, one of the directors, calls his film, "A spy story musical documentary" in which professional actors play the parts of archetypes; and real life actors like President Allende and the workers of Chile are themselves as they act out the historic election process that has been destroyed by the military putsch.

The elements of Allende's downfall are recorded in the film as the election battle rages. But also present were the

elements for the success of the first democratically elected

socialist government in South America.

Sandra Archer plays a Peace Corps worker involved with a CIA agent, played by Richard Stahl, and a far left radical, played by Pablo De La Barra. Between these extremes of deception, Allende appears rational and realistic.

The film is set at the very time that the Chileans accused the CIA of attempting to subvert their election so

that the right wing candidate could win. That charge was made during the Watergate episode and is being made again today. President Allende's presence throughout the film is moving and revealing, both of his stature and of his awareness

of the danger from his right wing enemies.
