Like its title, "Alone Among Women" is a provocative double-edged sword for both audience and target (a man). Much like previous German art house hit "Men," this comedy cleverly weaves feminism into a heterosexual mating dance. Predictable match should delight bran-and-fiber urbanites seeking politically correct foreign fare. Unique premise is based on a

trio of gorgeous feminists who set a trap for a gum-chewing, leather-clad swine, believing that if they can convert an "arrogant self-centered braggart" into a sensitive man, they've won the battle of the sexes. Unsuspecting of their experiment, unemployed Tom (smoothly played by Thomas Heinze) moves into the career women's basement and reluctantly accepts their job offer as househusband. Treated as a sex object by sadistic physiotherapist Vio and

ignored by battered Leah, sly Tom has his sights set on the fiesty, willowy blond electrician Annette (Jennifer Nitsch), who becomes increasingly confused about why she invited the fox into the hen house. Annette's jealous fit when she finds out about Vio and Tom's basement rendezvous leads to

potential lesson into a typical boy-gets-girl scenario. Even Climax is sound and satisfying without pandering to audience expectations.

Filmed on location in Ohio with partial funding from the state's arts council, pic has modest production values; sound quality in. particular is annoyingly uneven.

But the performances, especially Phillips' willfully hard-hearted grandfather, are first-rate.

for, but all too rarely pull off this well. — Joe Leydon
