Over the past two decades, Rohmer's fascination with the amorous foibles of his protagonists has provided viewers with a variety of endless pleasures through a number of filmic cycles. In this, the second instalment of a new quartet of films, "The Four Seasons of Eric Rohmer," he proves that he has lost none of his dexterity in examining the mysteries and contradictions, pain and silliness, of ordinary human relationships. Indeed, A Winter's Tale is one of his most telling and rewarding films in years. It begins with an idyllic prelude, a romantic encounter the young Félicie has one perfect summer during a vacation in Brittany. Five years later, Félicie is working in as a hairdresser in Paris. Having incorrectly noted her summer lover's address, she has inadvertently lost touch with him, a poignant loss in light of the fact that he left her pregnant and now in possession of a young daughter. This amorous interlude has coloured her subsequent relationships, even when a five year separation sees her having to choose between the attentions of a rather serious librarian and her attentive boss who owns the hair salon where she works. Félicie's voyage through the options afforded by these two men, with a third clouding her mind, allows Rohmer to spin his unique and winsome magic. Once more, he proves that he has no peer when it comes to examining the choices most of us confront in our daily lives. Fate intersects with circumstance, the heat of a Breton summer gives way to the chill of a Parisian December, Felicie makes a number of decisions with unforseen results, and Rohmer graces his material with the wisdom he has acquired through years of noting the myriad details of people's lives.

Eric Rohmer was born Jean-Marie Maurice Scherer in Nancy, France in 1920. A director of short films since the early sixties, he received more attention during that period for his astute film criticism. In 1950 he founded the short-lived "La gazette du cinéma," a post he held until 1963. He made a number of documentaries for French television and made his first feature film, Sign of the Lion, in 1959. But it was with his cycle of "Six contes moraux" that Rohmer garnered international attention. Rohmer has written the screenplays for all his films and co-wrote the book "Hitchcock" with Claude Chabrol.
