The period in European history between 1918 and 1939 marked the rebirth of historic Poland, achieved to a great extent by the efforts of General Jozef Pilsudski who held political power up to 1922 and again in 1926 as a dictator after a coup d'etat. In the short period in between, Polish democracy was given a severe test when the newly organized National Assembly elected Gabriel Narutowicz, a professor returning home from Switzerland to enter public life, as the first President in the history of the Polish Republic. Kawalerowicz's "Death of the President" focuses on the turmoil leading up to Narutowicz's election

by a National Assembly divided between Polish Nationalists and the minorities of Germans, Ukrainians, White Russians, and Jews comprising one-third of the population. The engineering professor's election to the presidency came as a surprise: his candidacy, supported by the Left Wing of the Peasant Movement, the Central Party, and the National Minorities, infuriated the Right-wing supporters of Pilsudski. A few days after the election, the President was assassinated by a fanatic Nationalist while opening an art exhibit. Pic recounts the drama in November and December of 1922 leading up to the assassination in the style of an on-the-spot tv-docu.
