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

"MONDO CANE" SCENE-BY-SCENE

In the town of Castellaneta, in the instep of the Italian boot, the blood of Rudolph Valentino (nee Guglielmi) flows in the veins of hundreds of his close and distant relatives. For thirty years the young men of Castellaneta have waited for Hollywood to "discover" among them the heir to the screen shiek's crown.

But the Valentino legend is already being perpetuated by Rossano Brazzi. When the Mister Muscles of Romance (Italian, of course) went to a large department store to order new shirts, hordes of predatory American females left their hero in his shorts after ripping "souvenirs" from his tanned frame.


The ladies are more direct on the archipelago of Trobriand, at the eastern tip of New Guinea. Here the women practice polyandry. There is no pretense about autograph-hunting and the first garment they tear off a captured male is not his shirt. Manhunting as a national sport has its analogous versions throughout the world. It's just played more sportily in Trobriand, in the open air and with bare torsos.

The manhunt is practiced in the open air along the French Riviera, too, and — to all intents and purposes — with bare torsos.

In the heart of New Guinea, the kingdom of hunger, men who have eaten human flesh break the misery of a five-year fast to stuff themselves with primitively-executed pigs. (Barbecue recipe: a slight singe.) Hundreds of pigs, the only fortune accumulated in the long years of abstinence, are killed and devoured for three days and three nights. Then again the long fast.

We have seen that the savages of New Guinea give favorable treatment to their dogs. But only in America does devotion to dogs exceed the limits of the ordinary imagination. In the Pasadena pet cemetery which inspired the novel by Evelyn Waugh, there are elaborate headstones, floral tributes and luxurious caskets for late pet dogs, cats and rats. The little graves of the departed animals are kept well-watered with the tears of their celebrated masters and mistresses.

The gourmets in Tai Pehi, on the island of Formosa, choose the most appetizing puppy directly from one of the cages in a restaurant. It matters not if the dachshund or poodle is intelligent, friendly and faithful, only if the animal is tasty.



In Strasbourg, more than half a million geese have such a quantity of food stuffed down their throats via funnel every day that even the silliest goose couldn't digest it in a week. The liver of the goose is totally upset by enormous over-nutrition, but it must be enlarged to appease the appetite of fanciers of pate de foie gras.

Those expensive steaks served up in a few specialized restaurants in Tokyo and New York are from calves bred on a fancy Japanese farm about 200 miles from Tokyo. To help the process of fattening, every calf is given six quarts of beer daily, administered directly from the bottle so it will have no chance to go flat.

Like the Strasbourg geese, the most beautiful women of the tribe are shut up in narrow wooden cages on Tabar, main island of the Bismarck archipelago. Here they are stuffed with Tapioca until they weigh at least 265 pounds, then offered as wives to the ruler of the village.

To work off the excess poundage accumulated during her last marriage, the American woman slims down in one of the Vic Tanny gymnasiums to be alluring enough to land her next husband. The Tanny gyms are way stations in the American woman's endless journey around the marriage circuit.

It is more difficult to get fat in Hong Kong. The little district markets are crowded with customers for crocodile, toad, snake, turtle, green lizard, etc., at five cents a pound. The price seems excessive to two million starving Chinese.

A light lunch costs around \$20. at a New York restaurant where the bill of fare includes fried ants, stuffed beetles, butterfly eggs, roasted worms, rattlesnakes, water-rats, etc. Wealthy folks, in consideration of the rarity and excellence of the dishes, feel that the price is right.

No shopper is more finicky than a Malay in a Singapore snake mart. Since the Malay know his snakes, he carefully selects a reptile according to all the strict requirements for edibility: weight, length, color, age, condition of skin. Rejects (about 50%) are regularly shipped to America and Europe.


Faith in goodness is reflected by the annual parade in Cocullo, a village in the Abruzzi, when the image of Saint Domenico is carried in procession, with the faithful following it with their hands full of snakes. The legend is that the saint, with strength of love, once turned the snakes infesting the valleys into tame and non-poisonous creatures.

On Holy Friday in the village of Calabria, the flagellation of Christ is exalted in the rite of the "vattienti" who lacerate their legs with corks full of pieces of glass and run along sprinkling their blood on the streets.

Mouth-to-mouth respiration is the most interesting part of the life-saving experiment on Sydney's Manly Beach, where the "Girl Life Savers" (aged 16 to 20) celebrate the tenth year of their dedication to saving bodies. Statistics show that Australian boys have become increasingly careless, and must be dragged from the ocean by "Girl Life Savers" in an ever growing number.

The zoological world of Bikini atoll has suffered profound change since the last American atom bomb exploded in this zone ten years ago. Birds that usually stayed in their underground nests only long enough to hatch their eggs do not come out at all; even though a peril no longer exists, the instinct to survive by staying in their holes has been transmitted to successive generations. Fish that normally could live out of the water only briefly have learned to abandon the foul and radioactive ocean for many hours a day in the trees. Thousands of eggs that will never hatch cover the surface of the atoll. The sea turtle's sense of orientation has been destroyed by the atomic contamination. Tired and bewildered, instead of going towards the water, it struggles toward the interior of the island, where it will be killed by the sun and fatigue.

Screen: 'Mondo Cane,' a Series of Believe-It-or-Not Vignettes

Candid Film Probes the Weird and Bizarre

MONDO CANE, written by Gualtiero Jacopetti; photographed by Antonio Climati and Benito Frattari; produced by Mr. Jacopetti and presented by Times Broadway and 47th Street, and the Little Carnegie, 57th Street east of Seventh Avenue. Running time: 105

There are more things in heaven and earth, Horatio, Than are dreamt of in your philosophy.

THAT trenchant remark of I Hamlet's might serve as an explanatory note to the documentary film, "Mondo Cane" ("A Dog's World"), which opened at the Forum and the Little Carnegie yesterday.

For there is more of a strange and grotesque nature -more that is weird, paradoxical, bizarre and reflective of the range of man's behavior-in this extraordinarily candid factual film than could come within an average man's experience or be likely to be seen often on the screen.

Indeed, the main intent of this picture, produced and, as the credits say, "conceived" by Gualtiero Jacopetti, an Italian journalist and newsreel man, seems to be to astonish the viewer with close-ups of the world's anomalies and stagger him with illustrations of how ironic and paradoxical life is.

"Mondo Cane" is a sort of cinematic compilation of believe-it-or-not vignettes.

Beginning with a photographic look-in on a strange, narcissistic ceremonial involving a batch of aspiring actors in the town where Rudolph Valentino was born, it leaps to a clearly staged encounter of Rossano Brazzi with a lot of clamoring girls and from that to a scene of brash young women in New Guinea chasing a locally rare young man along a beach. The consistency of interests and customs is obvious and droll. itself to this state?

But the film does not stay long in this humor. From these bare-bosomed girls in Trobriand, it switches to a candid contemplation young coquettes on the French Riviera, obviously emphasizing the paradox of the male attitude, and from that to a glimpse of the ritual of a bereaved mother in New Guinea nursing a suckling pig. Thence it jumps to a horrifying sequence showing the wholesale slaughter of pigs for an orgy of feasting in this same region-and so on to more weird and hideous things.

Somehow, the social paradoxes turn mostly upon food and sex, with some cynical interpolations of notes on man's fouling of his own nest. Grotesque shots of people mourning in a pet cemetery in Los Angeles are followed by shots of customers savoring roasted dog in a restaurant in Formosa, while other animals due for roasting yap in cages nearby.

Bland young women in the Bismarck archipelago are kept in cages and fattened to become desirable brides; middle-aged women in a reducing salon in California sweat and strain to slenderize. Old folks lie in loneliness and sorrow in a House of Death in Singapore, while their relatives feast and make merry in nearby restaurants, waiting for them to die.

Signor Jacopetti's color cameras are voracious and frank in what they see, emphasizing grotesqueness in close-ups and being supported by a brilliant musical score and a witty English commentary that reflects the ironic attitude.

The final sequence showing cliff dwellers in the dark New Guinea wilds and the practice of the "cargo cult," or worship of the airplane by naked natives in this deep, benighted land, bring the film to a brilliant conclusion on a strong anthropological note. So this is the way it all started! Will society return

Ironies of Life Lead To Italian's Film Hit

ROME, April 22.-Along the length of the Via Veneto, where members of the international movie set meet in eternal conclave, the numberone topic of conversation these days is Gualtiero Jacopetti.

In fact, the colorful, 43-yearold producer - writer - director, whose "Mondo Cane" recently opened in New York, is currently basking in the same sort of status that descended upon Federico Fellini three years ago when his "La Dolce Vita" became the world's most talked about motion picture.

Curiously enough, both Fellini and Jacopetti turned to film making after lengthy careers as newspapermen. Fellini mirrored his experience through the character Marcello, the newspaper man in "La Dolce." Previously he had been a political cartoonist and journalist.

Cloak and Dagger

Jacopetti became a nationally recognized by-line "name" by virtue of his cloak-anddagger exploits as a counterintelligence officer with the 5th Army, and subsequently as an adventurous war correspondent. Later, as editor for a newsreel company he enhanced his reputation by adding his own brand of biting satire to the commentary.

Another key factor in shaping his current style was a writing stint for an Italian feature documentary, "Europe By Night," directed by Alessandro Blasetti.

Partly as a reaction to certain conventional and syrupy aspects of the world portrayed in this flm, Jacopetti set off on a transcontinental trip to look for additional and different material. The notes he gathered formed the basis for "Mondo Cane," which became a reality when he met the Italian producer and financier Angelo Rizzoli, who agreed to bankroll the unsual project.

Nose for News

Jacopetti's dual capacity as writer and director on the global odyssey enabled him to give full rein to his gift for social comment, while his "nose for news" directed him toward such previously never filmed sights as the brutal Festival of the Pigs in famine ridden central New Guinea, or the gruesome interior of a House of Death in Macao.

Jacopetti has a knack for linking his vignettes into categories. We have the Strasbourg geese being force-fed until their livers become enlarged, in the cause of proper pate de foie gras, and then an abrupt cut to Tabar in the Bismarck archipelago where fatness is the criterion of feminine beauty and prospective wives of the village ruler are locked in cages and stuffed with tapioca until their weight approaches 300 pounds.

Mondo Cane (coming shortly to the Little Carnegie Theatre) roughly means "A Dog's Life." For nearly two hours the camera explores 29 far-flung places, and at every stop you can hardly wait to get out of there. Seldom has a single movie turned up such a continuously gruesome chamber of horrors, each one depicted in blood-curdling Technicolor.

In lush New Guinea, the citizens get set for a tribal feast by clubbing pigs to death in the village square.

On picturesque Formosa, restaurants are stocked with barking poodles, dachshunds and chows which hungry patrons select from cages and have cooked to order.

In sunny Los Angeles, ladies who have gorged on more familiar fare desperately try to regain their shapes at Vic Tanny gyms.

In quaint Strasbourg, France, geese are forcibly gorged to swell their livers for the pâté de foie gras trade.

In fun-loving Sydney, Australia, teen-age girls heroically save bathers from jaws of voracious sharks.

In colorful Malaya, fishermen take revenge on man-eating sharks by stuffing their gullets with prickly, poisonous sea urchins which kill them after a week of agony.

On far-off Bikini, sea turtles lumber ashore to lay eggs and then, robbed of any sense of direction by A-bomb poisoning, they confusedly head inland to a certain, sun-baked death.

In modern Rome, 350-year-old bones of Black Plague victims are kept shiny by young volunteers who climb into the catacombs with polishing rags at the ready.


Other macabre sequences depict the bloody beheading of bulls and pitiless human flagellation. This ghoulish pageant is accompanied by blithe waltzes and/or celestial choirs. The effect is hypnotic—you never know what horror is coming next—but after a while you begin to wonder, what's the point?


There isn't any. A talented director, Gualtiero Jacopetti, simply decided to show how ridiculous at best, and how bestial at worst, people are everywhere. But his tract against mankind is so superbly photographed and edited for shock appeal that it is bound to be the season's most argued-about film.

Warning: See Mondo Cane on an empty stomach.

In an underwater cemetery of the Malay archipelago, the natives bury their dead because their religion teaches that the sea washes the bodies of the dead and frees them from sin. The bones that remain after the sharks accomplish their devastating work are arranged among the twisted branches of the coral by parents and friends of the dead.

To provide rich Chinese communities inland with powdered sharkbone, a highly-prized aphrodisiac, the natives of Rajput, a village on the Malayan coast, continue to risk disfigurement, maiming or their lives. Fishing for man-eaters is their only resource; the village is poor and the Chinese pay well for their vices.

Commerce is renounced for the day as Rajput fisherman seek revenge. Each shark is returned to the sea with a poisonous sea urchin in its throat — to suffer for a week or more before dying.

In the Roman cemetery of the Capuchins, a museum today, the result of patient work of centuries is macabre, but indicates a genuine search for the beautiful. In an effort to introduce a feeling of immortality to a scene of death, the monks were buried in complete habits in an upright position.

The fraternity of the Red Sacks continue to protect the mortal remains of poor and unknown victims of the black plague, buried here in Rome more than three and a half centuries ago. The bones are honored in periodic ceremonies; protected against the ravages of time by a few families of the quarter.

In a Hamburg beerhouse, memories of cemeteries are drowned in beer, beer and more beer. A rather desperate concentration on the cult of life distracts the Germans from the memory of the cult of death.

In Tokyo, the ancient ceremony of the bath and massage is celebrated as 6 million Japanese women take care of 4 million Japanese men. Every part of his body is explored, cleaned and revived. Japanese etiquette requires that the customer be nude, but to pay lip service to our own etiquette, we have covered him up.

A rich Chinese in the city of Macao gets a careful make-up job in preparation for his funeral. Offerings of food are deposited on the temple altar by friends so that the dead may eat during the long journey; the dead man's money is burned so that it may follow him to heaven.

"If you don't die soon," the Chinese pray, "your good dinner will get cold." Notorious for their physical laziness, the Chinese saves both his money and energy for the table and the bed. Nowhere do people eat more than in the Chinatown of Singapore where at the table are celebrated religious and national holidays, weddings, births and even death. In the streets below a house of death, the relatives serenely await the moment of the funeral celebration.

For automobiles, the house of death is America. They are heaped up in enormous cemeteries, compressed into solid blocks of scrap iron, sent to the great European automobile factories to be restored to life and re-baptized as "utility cars". In one of the best known modern art galleries in Paris we see that the bones of an old Ford has been rechristened suggestively "esprit de la carrosserie", price \$100,000.

The Czechoslovakian painter Yves Klein is ready. Dripping with blue paint they have smeared on their shapely bodies, the models go to leave their print on the canvas. Klein guides his human brushes with the dynamic magnetism of his creative genius. The work will sell for a mere \$8,000.

Here is the arrival in Honolulu of three thousand American tourists, their appearance almost a caricature of American tourists, ready (nay, eager) to follow the program of the "Hawaiian Travel Organization" point by point. What a blessing that everything is organized: the disembarkation with unctious "Big Brother" greetings via loudspeakers, the photographic documentation which later will prove to friends that the Hawaiian girls smothered them with smiles and flower leis.

The tourists are initiated into the art of the hula. They listen, applaud, are amused and moved, just as was stated in the program. They believe in the hula, in themselves, in their own and other's happiness, this generation that has worked hard in youth and allows itself some massacrating rest only at the first signs of rheumatism.

Gurka warriors, ferocious highlanders from Nepal, are required by tradition to dress in Female attire for their celebration dance. Seeing them dressed as women, one wouldn't think that when they were taken prisoner by the Japanese during the last war, three hundred of them preferred decapitation to breaking the oath of fidelity to His Brittanic Majesty.

In Villafranca de Xira, Portugal, the crowd gaily celebrates the traditional "Forcada" by inciting the bulls let loose in the streets. The bulls provide the desired action by killing four persons and sending another eighteen to the hospital. In the afternoon, young noblemen give proof of great courage in the arena.

Here is a moment in any and every day, four, five, ten thousand years ago. Here are the last of the cavemen, still armed with clubs, in the mountains in the region of Geroka, in New Guinea. As wild and suspicious as beasts, they do everything according to the eternal drive of instinct: work, idleness, children, food, the need to communicate and to have an orderly and sociable life.

Fifty miles north, a Catholic mission is the last outpost of civlization. Where men only discovered the world yesterday, they immediately need a faith to give them the hope of being better in a better world. But not before five missionaries had been killed.

The "Cargo Cult", which is simply a deification of the cargo planes the native has observed along the great oceanic route that connects Hong Kong with Australia, is a new faith. The natives of the Rozo and Mekee tribes have fashioned their own crude landing strips and wait motionless, scrutinizing the sky. They believe that the planes come from paradise, that their ancestors send them to them. The wily white thieves manage to attract them to the "great trap" of Port Moresby. But sooner or later the ancestors will discover the fraud and will guide the planes on to their track.

GUALTIERO JACOPETTI

WRITER, DIRECTOR AND PRODUCER OF "MONDO CANE"

Jacopetti's first professional mission — consisted in a difficult foreign correspondent mission to Vienna, at a time when the Austrian capital was off limits to Italian newsmen.

He sent back a series of stories which rocked the Italian press, at the same time resulting in a permanent associaiton with one of Italy's top dailies, Milan's "Corriere della Sera".

This was followed by the editorship which he still maintains — of one of Italy's top newsreel companies.

Jacopetti met producer Angelo Rizzoli at Cannes Film Festival and explained his ideas for an "unconventional" travel documentary. Though there were no precedents for this type of film, Rizzoli promised backing, and Jacopetti began to prepare his project.

The film was shot on a carefully pre-planned trip around the globe, on which Jacopetti took along two onetime newsreel cameramen who had never before done feature work.

"I'm against polished-and-pretty lensing jobs anyway," Jacopetti explains. "Rather than the beautiful composition of the 'sunset on the Pacific' school, I'm for the picture as a document."

RIZ ORTOLANI APOSER ARRANGER AND CONDUCTOR

OF THE SCORE FOR MONDO CANE

who conceived and directed the film, and wrote the narration which contributes so tellingly to the total impact of the venture.

How does Jacopetti feel about the explosive controversy kicked up by "Mondo Cane?" The reactions are not only salutary, he insists, but necessary.

"There's always an explosion," he observes, "when one wakes people from their daydreams and asks them to look at the world as it really is rather than as they want to see it with their blindfold mentality. Of course 'Mondo Cane' is not for conformists - and there still are plenty of them around.

"Take our sequence about dogs, for example. Man generally likes dogs. His conscience is soothed by feeding them, helping them, pampering them, even burying them in special dog cemeteries. So it's completely logical that he should rebel at the sight of men in a far-away country eating dogs, considering them in fact a rare treat and specialty. Well, there are those who don't want to see the other face of the coin, or to be shaken out of the secure feeling that dog is man's best friend." Ironically, the more indignant spectators at "Mondo Cane" tend to blame Jacopetti for the dogs' unseemly fate, rather than those who order dog for lunch.

With the release here of "Mondo Cane", Americans are getting their first opportunity to get into the fray. Meanwhile, the controversy continues to rage in England, France, Germany, Italy, Spain, Japan, and South America, for "Mondo Cane" is still playing long-run record-breaking engagements in all these countries. A typical instance of the picture's box-office potency is its reception in Italy, where it has even topped the grosses for "La Dolce Vita".

"Mondo Cane" is backed by exploitation in depth. Part of the powerhouse promotional impact is evident in the fact that such leading magazines as Look, Life, Argosy and Adventure have run feature articles on the controversial movie.

The CBS Television show Camera #3 has also featured it on a national hook-up. This film has received great promotional backing on network television. It has been featured extensively on the "Tonight Show" and the "Today Show" (June 26, 1963) with Della Ree'se and Katyna Ranieri singing the theme song from Mondo Cane, "More." The Jack Paar Show (May 31, 1963) is another nationally televised program to jump on the Mondo Cane bandwagon.
