Representing a substantial departure in mood from his earlier "Ashes and Dismonds" and "Kanal," and from his later "Siberian Lady Macbeth and "Sameon," Wajda treats the subject of a boy-girl encounter with considerable gaiety, mischief and exuberance. A young doctor picks up an attractive girl in a coffee house and offers her a bed for the night. The outward sophistication of both results in a classic game of seduction with moments of hilarity. Performances are excellent and the over-all effect is a warm and enchanting lightness ware in Polish films.
