Joan Crawford sits down to play her grand piano. Done up in a white lace dress, stunning, in fact, she is not ready for a musicale. Her expected guests are a lynching posse. "Baroque-very baroque" was Director Nicholas Ray's amused comment. He had roughed up the rules again.

JOHNNY GUITAR is a mean, punchgut western, unsettling when it came out in the mid 1950's, but one that fascinates a growing number of followers today. It concerns the flaming feud of an icy saloon keeper, Vienna, La Crawford, pitted against a hotly hysterical foe, Mercedes McCambridge. Gutteral against shrill, they crowd the men of the cast - Sterling Hayden and

Scott Brady - into the shadows. (The ladies loathed each other off the set as well; at one point Crawford is said to have distributed her rival's wardrobe over a highway.)

The picture put to test a "go for broke" idea, according to Ray. The results are in. It's a winner.

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
