Carlos Saura whose Baroque, symbol-laden "Garden of Delights" was generally hailed by crix, and is one of the most talented directors in Spain, has turned to similar, albeit simpler fare, telling the yarn of an English girl who impinges upon a strange Spanish family.

The usual Saurian symbols are again set afloat, but made into virtual caricatures of Hispanic foibles: the supposedly decadent archtypes of the Spanish power structures such as three brothers whose childhoods have been twisted by a hysterical, overbearing mother and who are a mockery of 1) sexual repressiveness; 2) thwarted militaristic ambitions; and 3) the yearning for an absurd kind of saintliness.

In contrast to his previous pix, the symbols are too simplistic and unconvincing. The whole pic develops in a never-never land vitiated with frustration. Visually, pic makes less of an impact than his earlier efforts. The present pic lacks the texture of its predecessor and even the occasional humorous touches in "Ana" are heavyhanded.
