Nosferatu, A Symphony of Terror



**GERMANY 1921** 

Achilling draught from the world beyond," in Béla Balázs's phrase, blows through *Nosferatu*, far colder than anything in the many subsequent versions of the Dracula story, for all their greater sophistication. In the whole span of horror movies, perhaps only Dreyer's *Vampyr* matches it for sheer unearthliness. ...

Most German horror films of the period, following *Caligari*, were claustrophobic, studio-bound, filled with heavy shadows and distorted expressionist sets. Murnau rejected this convention; much of *Nosferatu* was filmed on location, in rugged mountain landscapes and on quiet northern streets. And these authentic surroundings, far from rendering the horror prosaic, seem themselves to be infected by Nosferatu's monstrous presence... The Nosferatu of Max Schreck is unforgettably grotesque from his first manifestation – no hint of the superficial urbanity of Lugosi or Christopher Lee. Tall, cadaverously thin, bald, bat-eared, rabbit-toothed, he moves with short jerky steps, taloned hands close to his sides, as though permanently confined by the shape of his diurnal coffin. The effect is near-ludicrous, chilling, and ultimately even pitiful... Beside him, the other characters fade to insignificance...

Nosferatu was made on a modest budget for the small Prana company, one reason perhaps for the sparing use of trick effects... Two brief episodes of stopaction cause figures to move with a deranged clockwork rapidity. But generally Murnau relies on subtly off-centre framings and disorienting camera angles to convey the insidious menace of his vision, often focusing on some small, allusive detail... – Philip Kemp, 'FW Murnau', in World Film Directors, vol.I, 1890-1945 (1987)

◆ FW MURNAU Born 28 December 1888, Bielefeld, Germany, as Friedrich Wilhelm Plumpe. After studies at Heidelberg University, he went to Berlin to work – first as an actor, then as an assistant director – for Max Reinhardt. He spent most of World War I in Switzerland, where he directed a play and helped prepare propaganda films for the German embassy in Berne. In 1919 he returned to Germany to begin his career as a film director. He quickly established himself as one of the great visual stylists of the cinema with such classic films as Nosferatu. The Last Laugh and Faust. The



with such classic films as *Nosferatu*, *The Last Laugh*, and *Faust*. The international success of *The Last Laugh* brought him to Hollywood in 1927, where he was given carte blanche at Fox to direct another masterpiece, *Sunrise*. He died in a car crash in California on 11 March 1931, a week before the premiere of his last film, *Tabu* (co-directed with documentarist Robert Flaherty).
