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

## **UN CHIEN ANDALOU**

It is indeed rare to see Buñuel's revolutionary collaboration with Salvador Dali in a 35mm print. A sliver of cloud scudding across the moon finds a slicing rhyme in a razor cleaving an open eye in the famous first images of what Buñuel called "a desperate plea for murder." From that opening salvo, the film surges forward on a stream of dream-like images of disgust, desire, blasphemy, and amour fou. Rightwing groups attacked theatres where the film showed, and UN CHIEN ANDALOU retains a power to shock in excess of anything right-wingers love to attack now.
