SYNOPSIS

The film takes place during the famous October days. In the fierce struggle against counter-revolutionary forces, the Red Guard patrols establish Soviet power everywhere. In an exchange of fire, a worker is killed by the son of a factory owner. The worker's little girl Katiouchka becomes an orphan, and in brief scenes intercut with other action Katia is seen in a Soviet youth collective and working in the factory where her father had worked. Meanwhile the factory owner and his son conspire to emigrate. They are seen in Paris enjoying the high life, and spending their smuggled fortune lavishly. Several years go by and they are seen in down and out circumstances in a run-down rooming house. Zagoblin's son decides to sneak back to Russia to dig up the family jewels his father had buried there during the October days. Disguised as a chaffeur, and with the aid of a reactionary kulak home-brew manufacturer, the young Zagoblin wins the confidence of the worker's collective established on his former grounds, and wins the affection of Katia. The kulak is arrested for making illegal homw brew, and a letter in his possession informs the police that young Zagoblin is back. Electrification of the village continues under the direction of Andre, Katia's former suitor, chagrined by her attentions to Zagoblin. Eventually Zagoblin is apprehended in the act of recovering the hidden jewels, and he is shot while trying to escape. Katia suffers bitterly for her mistake. She takes a job in a pre-school center. She tells the children about Lenin's life. It is January 1924, and all are concerned over the deteriorating heath of the leader. Word comes that Lenin has died. The workers do not want to believe the news, and send a horseman through the snow to the talegraph station for confirmation. The mourning in the factory turns into a powerful demonstration of love by people for the Folshevik party and its founder. Hundreds of workers, including Katia, join the ranks of the Bolshevik part.

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
