The cut-and-dried rules of the criminal world collide with the messy realities of human emotion in Roberta Torre's romantic tragedy of adultery and crime set in 1984 Palermo. Angela is the classic mollbeautiful, streetwise, loyal and possessing more than a touch of avarice. She manages the shoe store her husband Soro uses as a front, and makes deliveries to local drug dealers with a swaggering high-heeled strut. After a hit, she mops up the blood with the wary, dubious expression of a woman navigating a male-dominated world. Her face relaxes into a real smile only when Soro spreads jewelry before her—and when his protégé, Masino, drives her home, trading banter while her teenage daughter watches uneasily from the back seat. This is not a typical story of a bored young wife rebelling against a controlling older husband, or even of a woman trapped in a world she detests. Angela and Soro share a genuine tenderness, and there is little evidence that she's troubled by the crimes that provide her with luxuries. Angela's moral dilemma is based on her love for both men and her allegiance to the Sicilian Mafia. There are few clear-cut villains in Angela, its underworld setting notwithstanding, just a set of circumstances and choices that move the characters, inevitably, towards disaster.
