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## THE ALCHEMIST AND THE VIRGIN

Some interesting ideas are featured in this ambitious but ultimately muddled meller, which is fatally compromised by writer-director Zoltan Kamondi's uncertainties in style and tone. Neither a sci-fi thriller, a black comedy nor an erotic melodrama, but a bit of each and more, the film is fundamentally unbelievable and, in the end, becomes both excessively violent and tedious. Prospects are very slim.

Polski actor Mariusz Bonazewski plays Sziraki, a handsome science professor and inveterate womanizer seeking the solution to the age-old problem of the alchemists — how to make gold. When he starts a relationship with Esztena, an eager teenage virgin nicely played by Eszter Onodi, he discovers the magic ingredient his research lacked — virginity — and he does, indeed, manage to create gold, though the metal disintegrates after several hours. Meanwhile Esztena's burly would-be lover Maci (Norbert Novenyi), a pro fighter, seeks revenge on the man who exploited his g.f. Pic builds to an unexpectedly ugly scene. This mixture of mysticism, magic, horror, sex and comedy never gels, and despite lush production values, the film flounders accordingly.
