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Alicia En La Espana De Las Maravillas (Alice in Spanish Wonderland) (SPANISH-COLOR)

Strange, visually powerful but sometimes long winded takeoff on the Alice in Wonderland story, turned by Jorge Feliu (whose first serious pic this is) into a ferocious critique of the Franco years in Spain.

Using four different Alices, Feliu puts them through a hallucinatory maze, sometimes grotesquely symbolical, often harrowingly realistic as he lashes out at the Spanish ills of 40 years ranging over film censorship, anti-feminism, suppression of regional freedoms, ecclesiastical abuses, the raping of Alice by the multinationals (some rather naive anti-Americanism crops up, too) and dozens of other misadventures, some of them easy to grasp, other requiring a knowledge of Spain and her history. Alicia is a film hard to define. It is

professionally directed, photographed and acted; its varied images are often visually stunning and its liberal thrust is poignant, though sometimes it becomes redundant and labors the obvious. Still, "Alicia" is perhaps the most direct frontal attack so far on Franco Spain. Despite some of its shortcomings, it is a film well worth seeing for all interested in modern Spanish cinema. Item might do some biz in art and university circuits abroad.
