La Chienne has never before been seen in a subtitled version in America. The plot describes the downfall of a middle-aged man (Michel Simon in one of his finest performances) in love with a cold-hearted tramp. (This subject was later re-made here as Scarlet Street.) But Renoir neither sentimentalizes nor generalizes and this, combined with the warmth of his response to the Montmartre setting, makes La Chienne one of the great triumphs of realism. Paradoxically enough, it is, in spite of its subject, one of Renoir's most purely enjoyable films.
