Ra'up McGee

While working on a documentary in the heat of Indonesia, Ra'up McGee began to dream of a fiction shot in Paris that would be "blue and cold." Unable to speak a word of French, the young director wrote his first feature as an homage to sixties film noir, with French actors speaking French.

It is almost impossible to summarize the plot of Automne, as every incident in the complex scenario hinges on something from the past or relates to a twist yet to come. Three childhood friends, two boys and a girl, find themselves reunited in adulthood, all of them pursuing criminal careers. In fact, everyone in the film is a felon of some sort - hired killers mostly, with the occasional explosives purveyor, rapist or mob boss turning up. Love and death inextricably intertwine in this blacker-than- noir thriller, in which every perfectly-timed cut leads to another unexpected turn or moment of deeper deception.

The distinguished cast is headed by Irène Jacob (La Double Vie de Véronique), Laurent Lucas (Le Pomographe) and Dinara Drukarova (Depuis qu'Otar est parti) with terrific back-up from veterans Michel Aumont and Jean-Claude Dreyfus (who boast more than two hundred movies between them since 1972). The performances crackle; a mood can shift from menacing to seductive and back again in the averting of an eye.

McGee's direction is equally confident and subtle. He plays with style and atmosphere (the autumn woods, the cavernous subway platform), cinema convention (the perfect final shot formula, the crash editing) or strategic simplicity (the glance at the photo, the lovers in close-up). Automne is a nifty little genre movie made for about one million Euros.

Ra'up McGee was born in New York and is currently based in Los Angeles and Paris. A European cinema lover from an early age, he studied film at the University of California, San Diego and Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles. He has written, directed, edited and produced the feature-length documentary Ramadhan in Indonesia (97) and the documentary shorts Project Quest (98) and Harold Hitchcock: Life in Light (01). Automne(04) is his first narrative feature.
