The Soviets: Eisenstein and Vertov 5:00

Bruce Loeb on Piano

Telling of a factory worker's strike in Czarist Russia in 1912 and its brutal suppression, Eisenstein's Strike was one of the most original debuts in film history. In its brilliant mixture of agit-prop techniques and comic-grotesque stylization, it reveals the influence of the explosively rich contemporary theater in which Eisenstein was involved. Soviet Toys, Vertov's animated "kino-reklama" (film-advertisement) for

the "People's Bank," is a grotesque satire of NEP (New Economic Policy)-men and clergy as implacable enemies of the working class. One of the first animated films made in the Soviet Union, it is a curiously visceral example of film expressionism in which the NEP-man literally ingests all he covets.
