TIRECTED BY JOHN FORD is the first cinematic reference source of its kind, an examination of the creative process of filmmaking using the medium itself, film. Specifically it is a study of director John Ford and his films. Footage from 27 of Ford's films are combined with interviews with the director and three of his actors-Henry Fonda, James Stewart and John Wayne. Previous studies of a director's techniques, visual interests and subject matter have until now been confined to print and opinion. DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD is composed with the opinions of the people who made the films, and the moving, talking shadows of the films themselves.

In effect, DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD chronicles the westward plunge and spirit of America from before the Revolution, reveals the history of film's growth to a classic art form and explores the director's working relationship with his performers, his visual style and his themes. A complete film portrait of the director against the background of his fifty-seven years as an artist is presented in a visual recording to benefit growing numbers of filmmakers, educators, writers, critics and students.

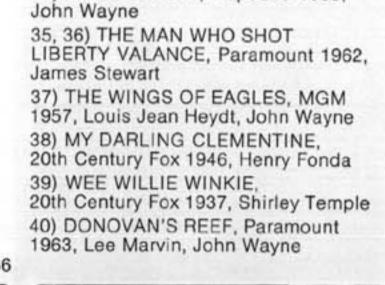
The approach is unique. American films, treated in documentaries designed for the classroom, have been presented largely as a commercial enterprise or for examination of a single film. Even in print the study of film art as the product of one man's vision, in the manner traditional arts are studied, is a relatively new approach. DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD combines this method of study with the medium of celluloid. Each separate film in the director's total production is reviewed against his entire output.

The history of American film contains many film directors, screen writers, producers, performers, craftsmen and executives of classic distinction. Many deserve an authoritative, detailed, scholarly examination of their work and its impact on American life. One, however, had to be first. The final argument in favor of selecting John Ford rested with his films, which have served as primers for many film directors.

DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD, in 16 mm prints, will be made available by the American Film Institute and will reach California's schools, libraries, colleges and universities, as well as film societies, arts councils, museums and other agencies devoted to film research and film training.

LIRECTED BY JOHN FORD seeks to demonstrate Ford's own special vision of the world. The stills from his films describe it best.

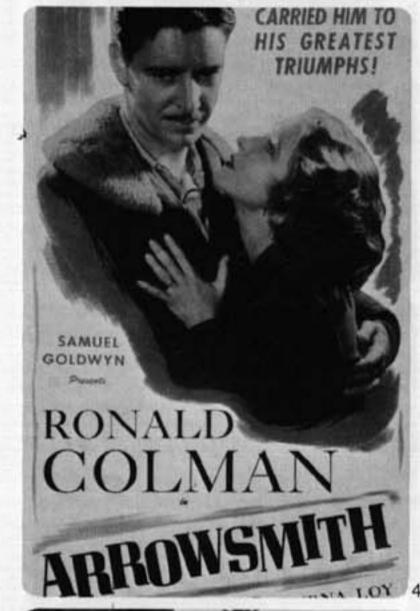

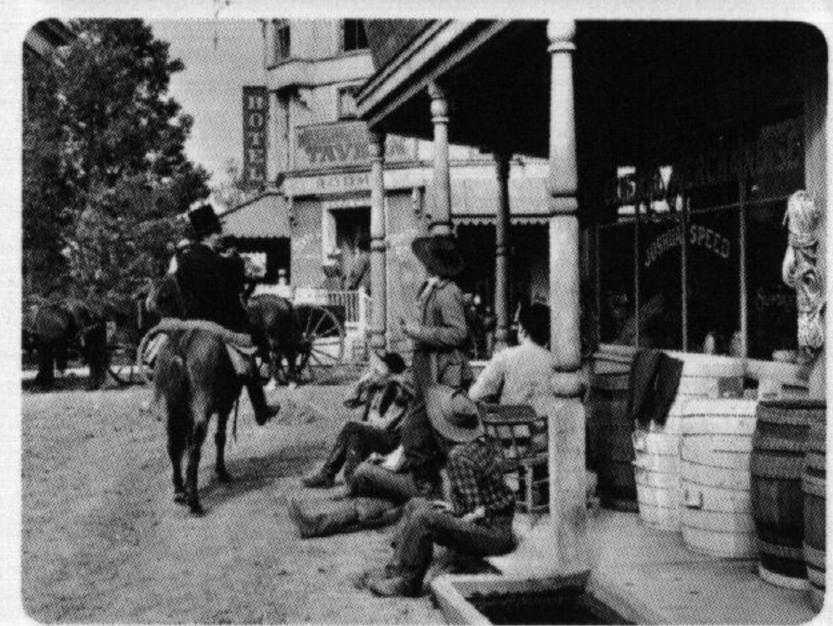

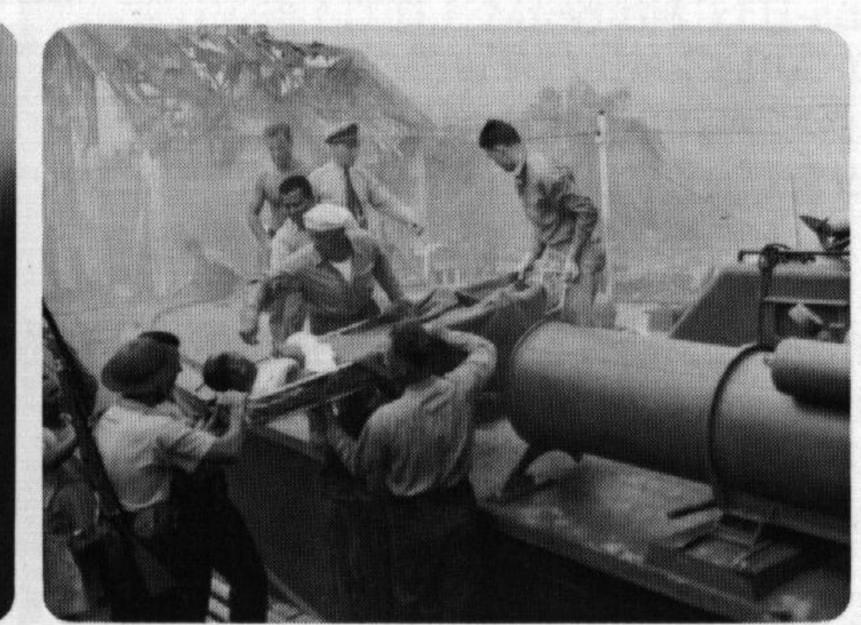

John Ford, born Sean Aloysius O'Feeney, 1895, in Cape Elizabeth, Maine, has been a director of film for 57 years. In that time he has produced more than 90 feature-length films and been awarded more accolades than any other man in his chosen profession.

His career began in 1914 upon joining his brother Francis, then at work at Carl Laemmle's Universal Studios. Ford states that he got his first job because Laemmle felt he yelled loud enough to become a director. Prior to that Ford had done everything from being a prop man to playing a member of the Ku Klux Klan in David Wark Griffith's classic, THE BIRTH OF A NATION.

Ford's early love of the western form led him to make more than 18 in the space of two years, from 1917 to 1919. Many featured Harry Carey, one of the first great cowboy stars, to whom he later dedicated his 1948 production of THREE GODFATHERS. Much of this part of Ford's career is obscured by the decay or the loss of his first films.

In the 1920's Ford made a number of features for Fox Productions including his first international success, THE IRON HORSE. With that film Ford began his chronicle of the American drive west. Ford understood America's fascination with its own history, much of it concerned with the varied drives and efforts to settle and tame the land.

John Ford turned to other settings, as well, in his empathy with man's attempt to shape his destiny. He made several films set in Irish ghettos, THE BLUE EAGLE, MOTHER MACHREE (1928); in India under British rule, THE BLACK WATCH (1929); and in rural America PILGRIMAGE (1933), DR. BULL (1933), and JUDGE PRIEST (1934).





JOHN FORD ON AMERICA: ITS HISTORY AND ITS HEROES



The next watershed in Ford's career came with the tremendous impact of THE INFORMER (1935) which won most of the critical awards of the time. The film is a highly expressionist evocation of rebellion-torn Ireland. Ford drew upon life in Ireland many times in his career. THE PLOUGH AND THE STARS (1936) and THE QUIET MAN (1952) are considered the most notable examples.

In 1939 Ford made two films which are classics in the history of the screen, STAGECOACH and YOUNG MR. LINCOLN. The films are remarkably similar, despite entirely different settings and characters, in the underlying simplicity, empathy and style of Ford's personal vision of America.

In the late Forties Ford made the three films termed the Cavalry trilogy: FORT APACHE, SHE WORE A YELLOW RIBBON, and RIO GRANDE. In these the mature Ford showed his masterful grip upon the visual image in film. Each film reveals the relationship of an individual to his group against the vast spaces of the unsettled West.

DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD examines Ford's rich and varied career by exploring his collective vision in an output of more than 140 films encompassing both the silent and sound era, an output which the director calls simply, 'a job of work."







In the twentieth century film has become a major agency I through which Americans communicate their feelings about themselves, their society, and their fantasies.

John Ford is, without exception, the master of the American story on film. His film works, from YOUNG MR. LINCOLN to FORT APACHE, are not only chronicles of the westward development of American society, but romantic evocations of the people and their attitudes, drives and dreams.

DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD points out this continuity of approach in Ford's work. Peter Bogdanovich, the film's writer-director, has written: "It would be instructive . . . to run Ford's films about the United States in historical chronology-because he has told the American saga in human terms and made it come alive."

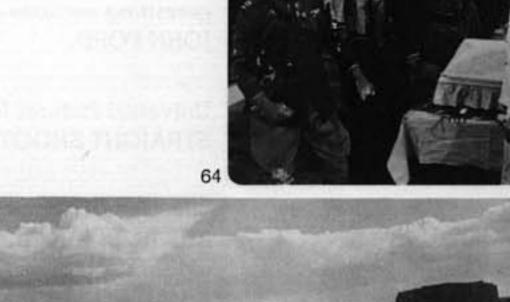
Ford's films are both a view of and a part of American history. His creative work is a prime document of American society during the twentieth century. His films are mirrors, which often render not an exact image of how things were, but rather how they ought to be, how Americans living in the twenties, thirties, forties, fifties and sixties wanted them to be, often of how John Ford remembers them.

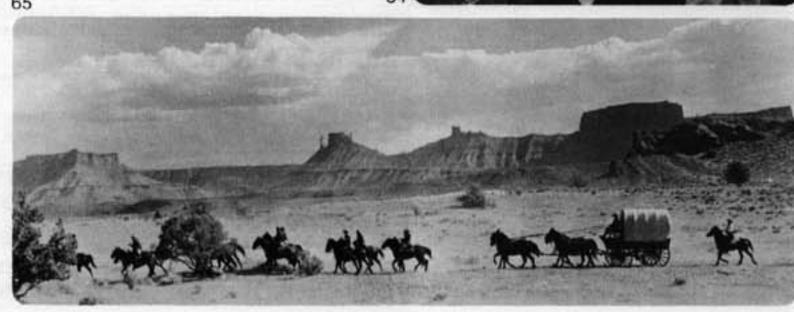
Ford's personal vision of the human condition is the most difficult and moving area of study. His heroes are frequently quixotic, entangled in lost causes and fighting losing battles against the flow of history. Peter Bogdanovich refers to this interpretation as "the glory in defeat." Ford's defeated heroes appear in THE LONG GRAY LINE, THE SEARCHERS, THE WINGS OF EAGLES and THE LAST HURRAH. These are men who labor against the current of life, but never seem to obtain what they desire. Yet, their struggles have a special nobility, so in the long run, it does not really matter whether they won or lost.







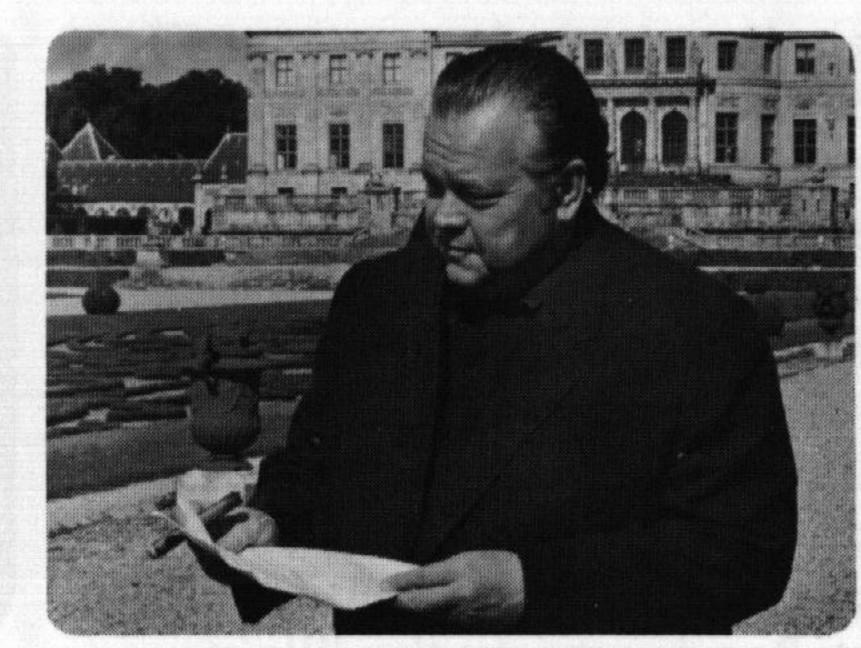

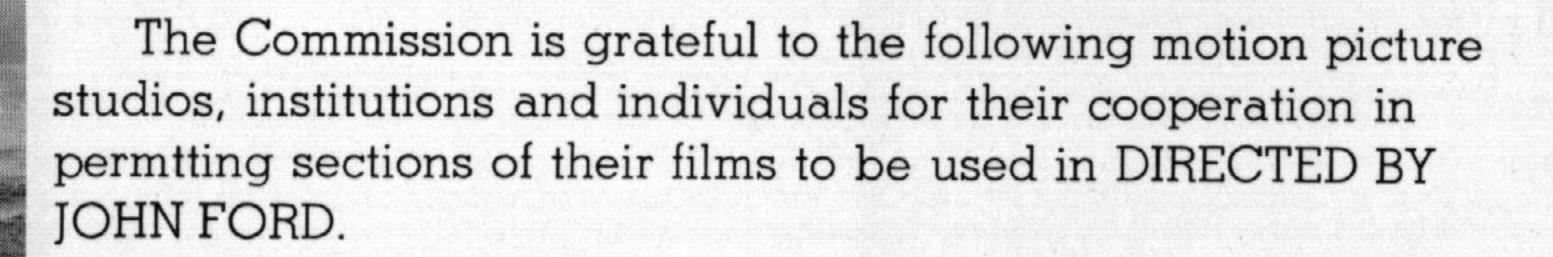

George Stevens, Jr. and James R. Silke are the coproducers of DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD. The Commission lauds their unique

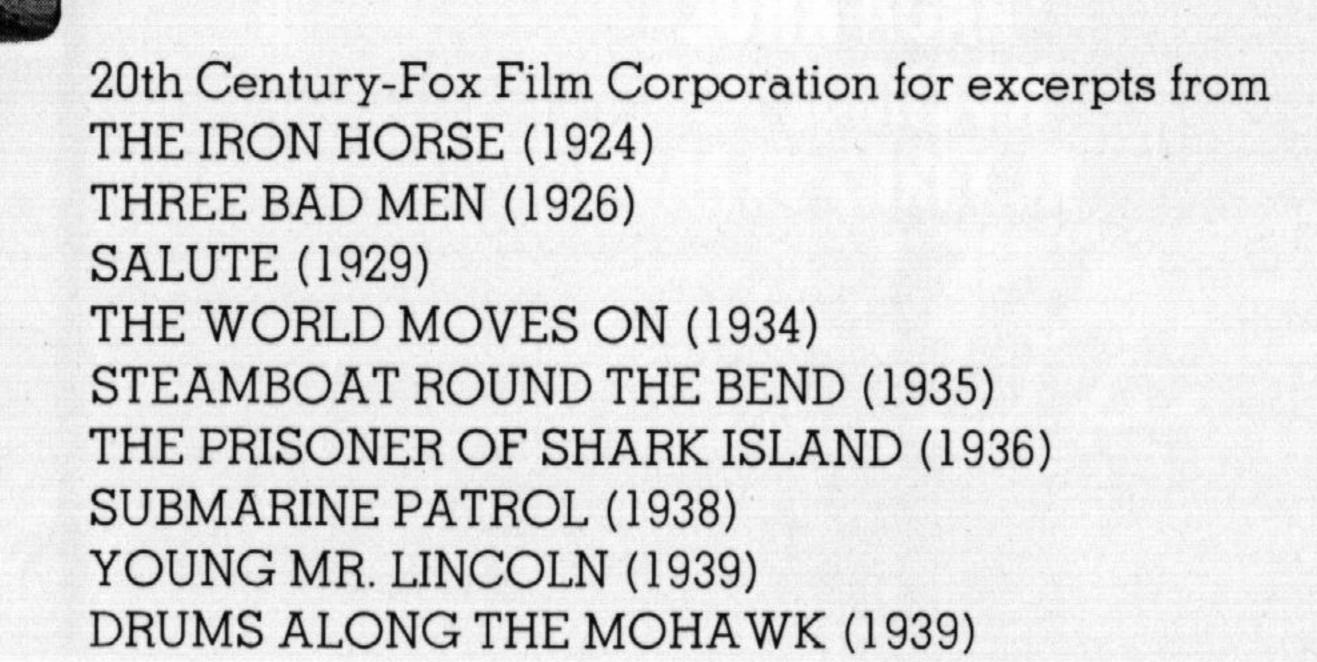


accomplishments in developing the idea of film on film, beginning with their film presentation at the original Festival of the Arts held at the White House in 1966, followed by their creation of the American film exhibit for the American Pavilion at Canada's Expo 67. David Shepard, associate producer of DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD, surmounted the overwhelming difficulty of finding actual footage from Ford's early films. "Most of Ford's earliest pictures were apparently lost forever, victims of nitrate decay," he notes.

"The master copy of STRAIGHT SHOOTING (Ford's first feature) was located in the Czech Archives and had to be brought from Prague. Those pictures from which had survived were scattered, their negatives Now, through the efforts of AFI Archives and the the project began, have been found, safeguarded, and, in most cases, made available again to audiences for the first time in more than forty years."

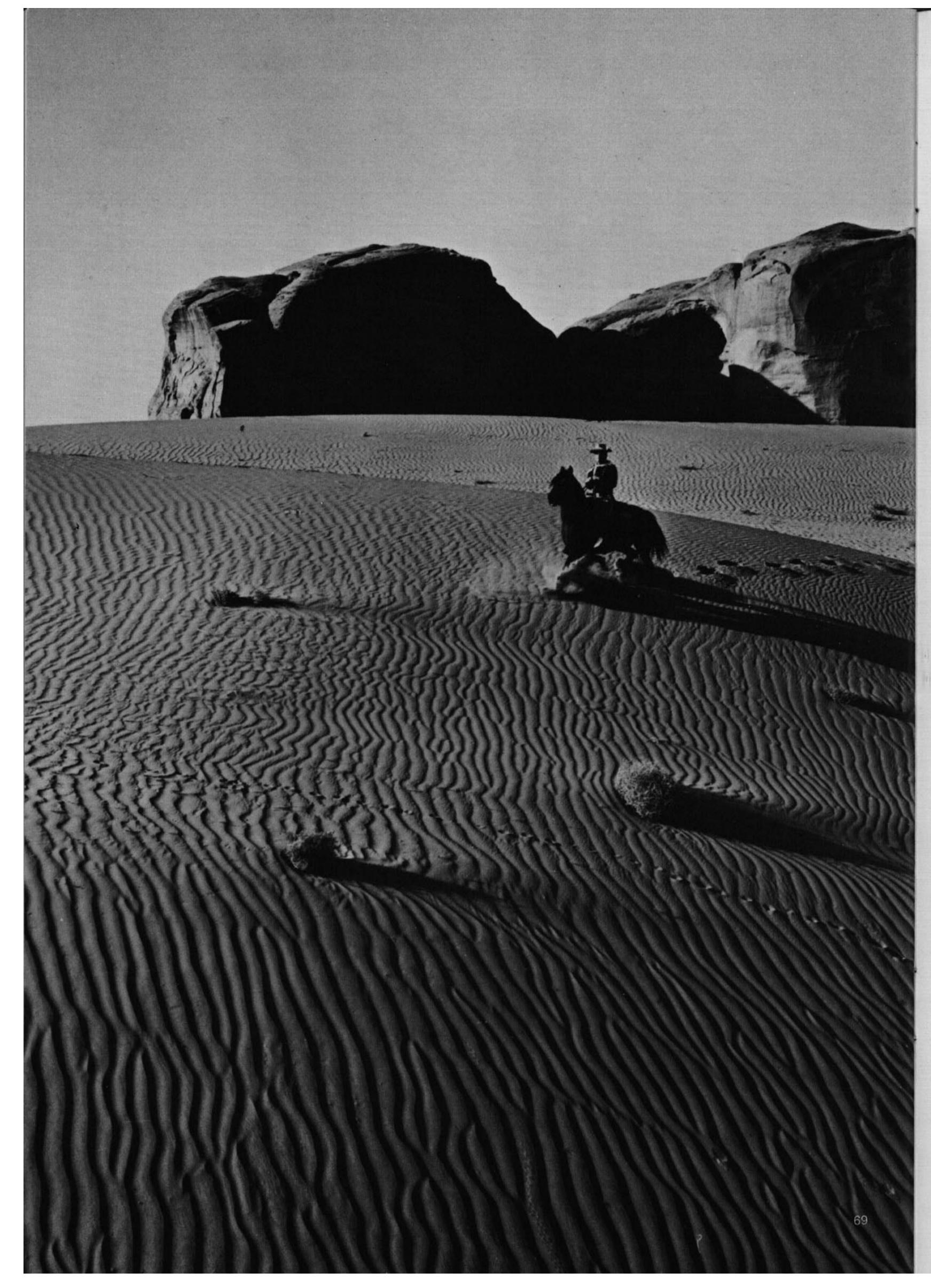

In recognition of the motion picture as a major American art form, with California the location of its early classic period, the Commission believes that DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD is particularly suited to serve the entire State, since a can of film is one of the most viable and effective means of reaching California's huge audience.

The Commission appreciates the great value in selecting John Ford. The opportunity is presented to trace his style as it pioneers the classic American film form and to unfold, in his subject matter, the American saga of the past 200 years. Historians, filmmakers and students are benefited alike.

As with its other activities, the Commission undertook DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD in response to its legislated mandate. The 1963 statute in the California Government Code (Title 2, Division 1, Chapter 9, Section 8751) marked the establishment of the California Arts Commission, declaring that it would "join with private patrons and with institutions and professional organizations concerned with the arts, to insure that the role of the arts in the life of our community will continue to grow and play an ever more significant part in the welfare and educational experience of our citizens."

The Commission is responsible directly to the Governor, who appoints its 15 members with the consent of the Senate. Two Assemblymen and two Senators are also appointed by their respective bodies in a non-voting capacity. The Commission's staff works to serve the policies established by the Commission as a whole. 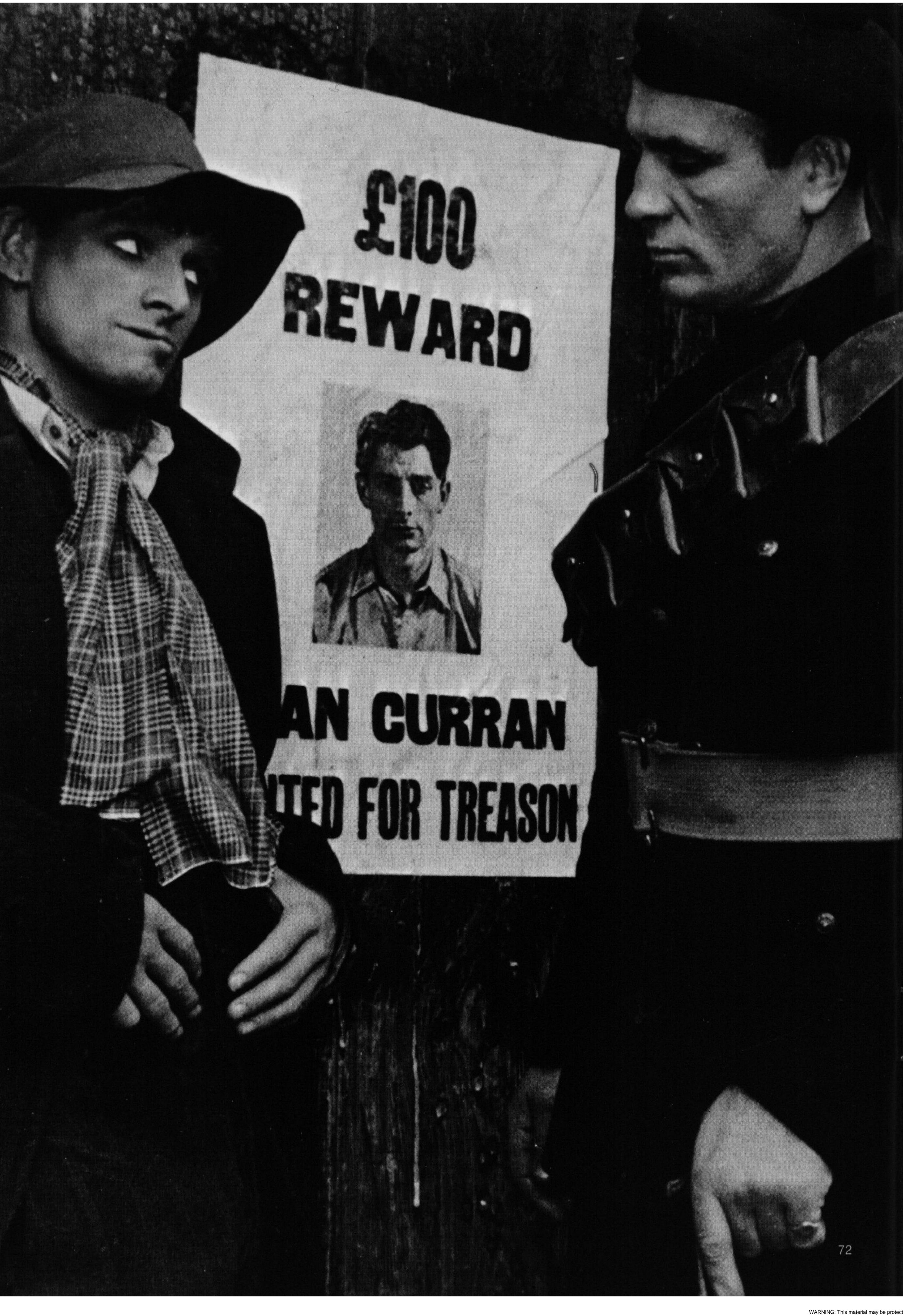


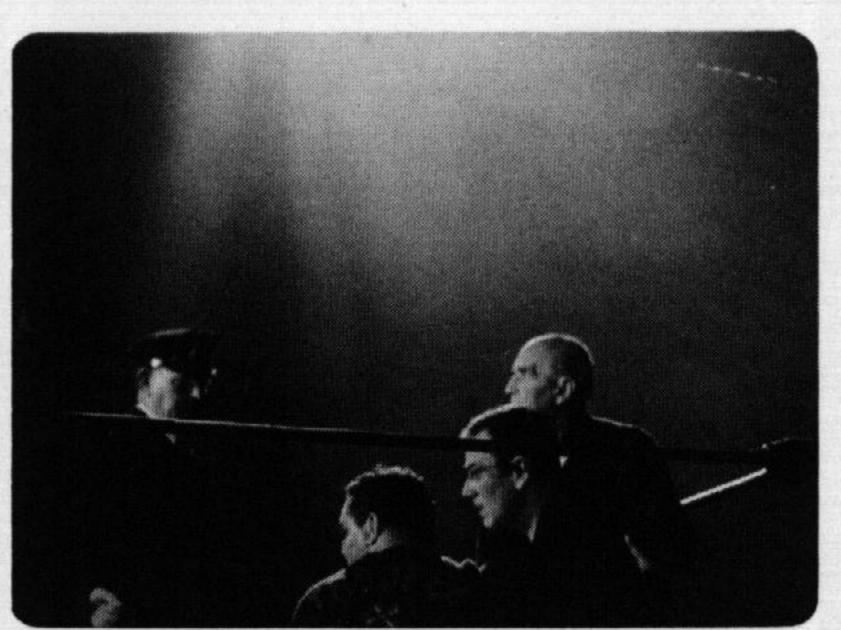

The California Arts Commission funds and administers projects in the areas of visual arts, performing arts, and community services in cooperation with existing arts organizations, communities, and private business.













Founded on June 5, 1967, as a nonprofit, nongovernmental corporation with headquarters in Washington, D.C., the American Film Institute was created in response to needs in several areas of film: preservation and archives, education, filmmaker training, production and publications. Its founding sponsors were the National Council on the Arts, the Ford Foundation and the member companies of the Motion Picture Association of America. They have been joined by a number of organizational and individual members. The Ford Foundation's support is directed toward the Center for Advanced Film Studies in Beverly Hills, where future directors, screen writers, cinematographers, film scholars, and educators participate in an educational program and where DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD was produced.

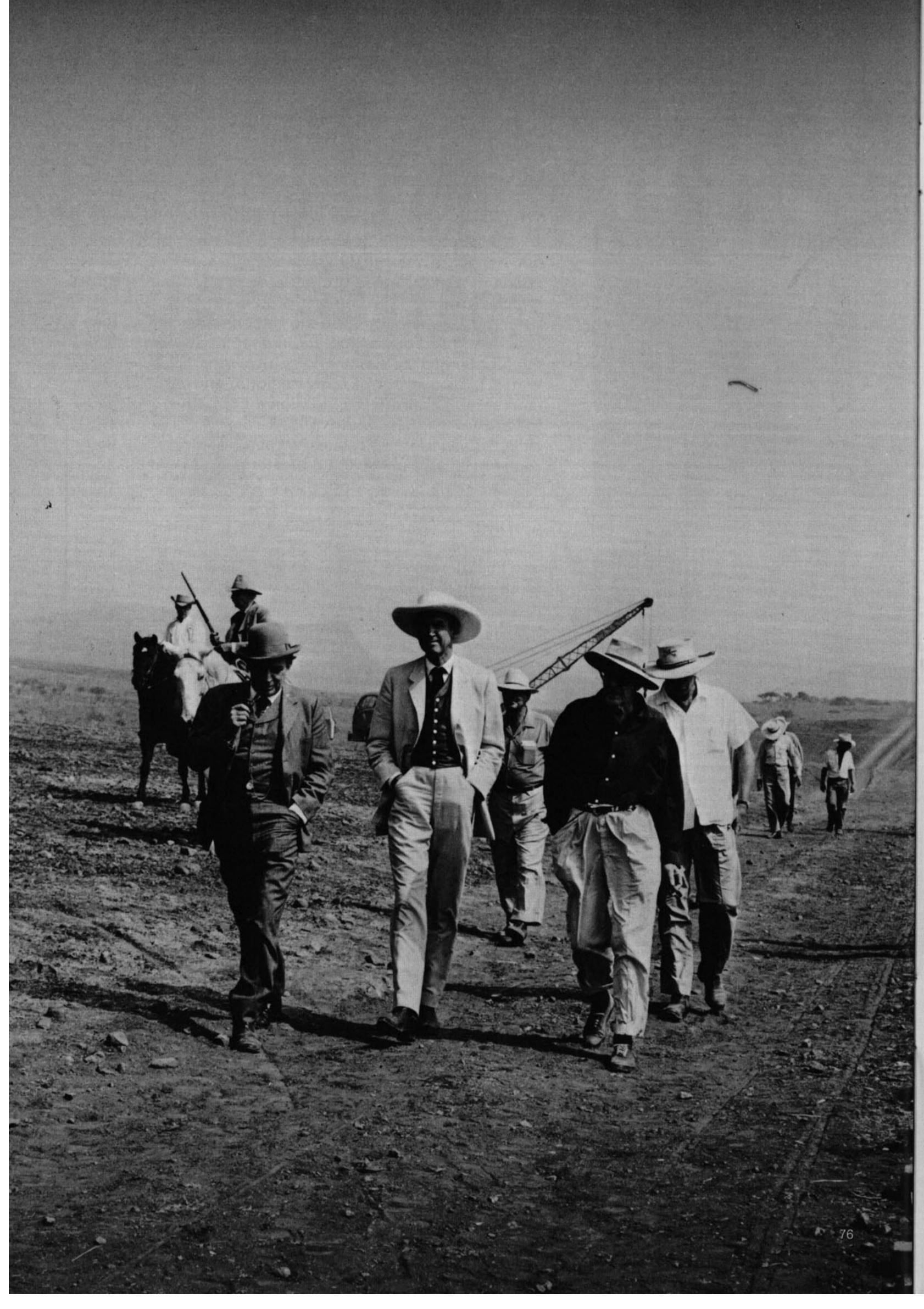
DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD is the first film about film-making that directly responds to needs in film education and film literature. As the archive of American films begins to fill with lost and restored films from the past, and as these films become available for educational use, scholarly and comprehensive studies of the film form become a necessity. From its inception, the American Film Institute's intention was to use film to conduct part of these studies. DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD will be followed by films about other directors and the various crafts and art forms that go into the creation of a motion picture.

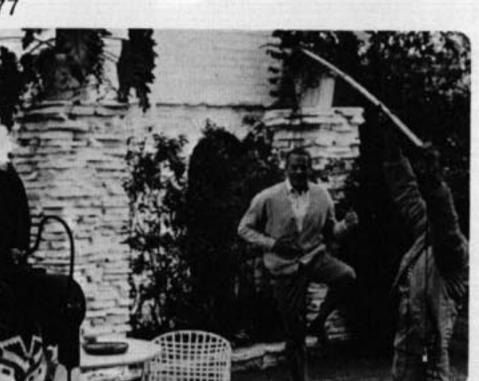
To date, sequences of classic American films have been unavailable to those who wish to study them. In addition, there has been little direct dialogue between those who make films and educators, scholars and students.

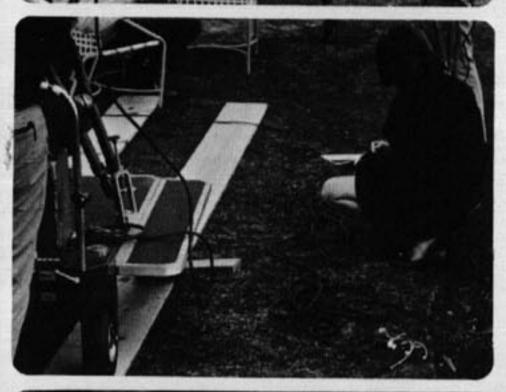

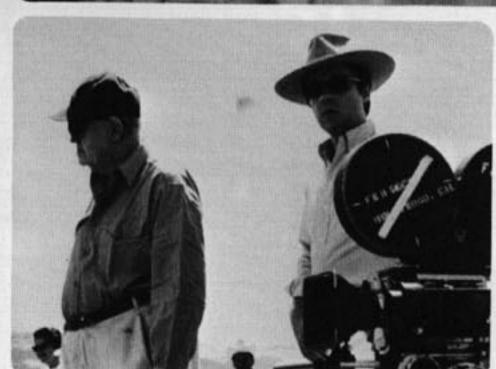
Peter Bogdanovich's interest in film first led him to organize and write the accompanying monographs for the retrospectives of Howard Hawks, Orson Welles and Alfred Hitchcock at the Museum of Modern Art in New York. His articles on film have been published in Esquire, Cinema, Movie and various scholarly film journals. In addition, he is the author of three books on film directors: John Ford, Fritz Lang in America, and Alan Dwan, and is preparing a

fourth on Orson Welles.

Learning the process he had written about, Bogdanovich began working on films in 1968 with producer/ director Roger Corman and directed his first feature, TARGETS, in 1969. The success of that film led to directing others. Bogdanovich has recently completed work on THE LAST PICTURE SHOW for BBS Productions/Columbia and is currently shooting WHAT'S UP DOC? for Warner Brothers, starring Barbra Streisand and Ryan O'Neal.

Much of the literature of film has been written by those who have not studied the primary source material, the films, or the process of making films. Bogdanovich, however, has substantiated his major contribution to the literature about John Ford by viewing every Ford film known to exist, expanding his understanding of the films and the man. The writer/ director of DIRECTED BY JOHN FORD brings to the film not only the most qualified scholarship, but the understanding and talents of the professional film director.



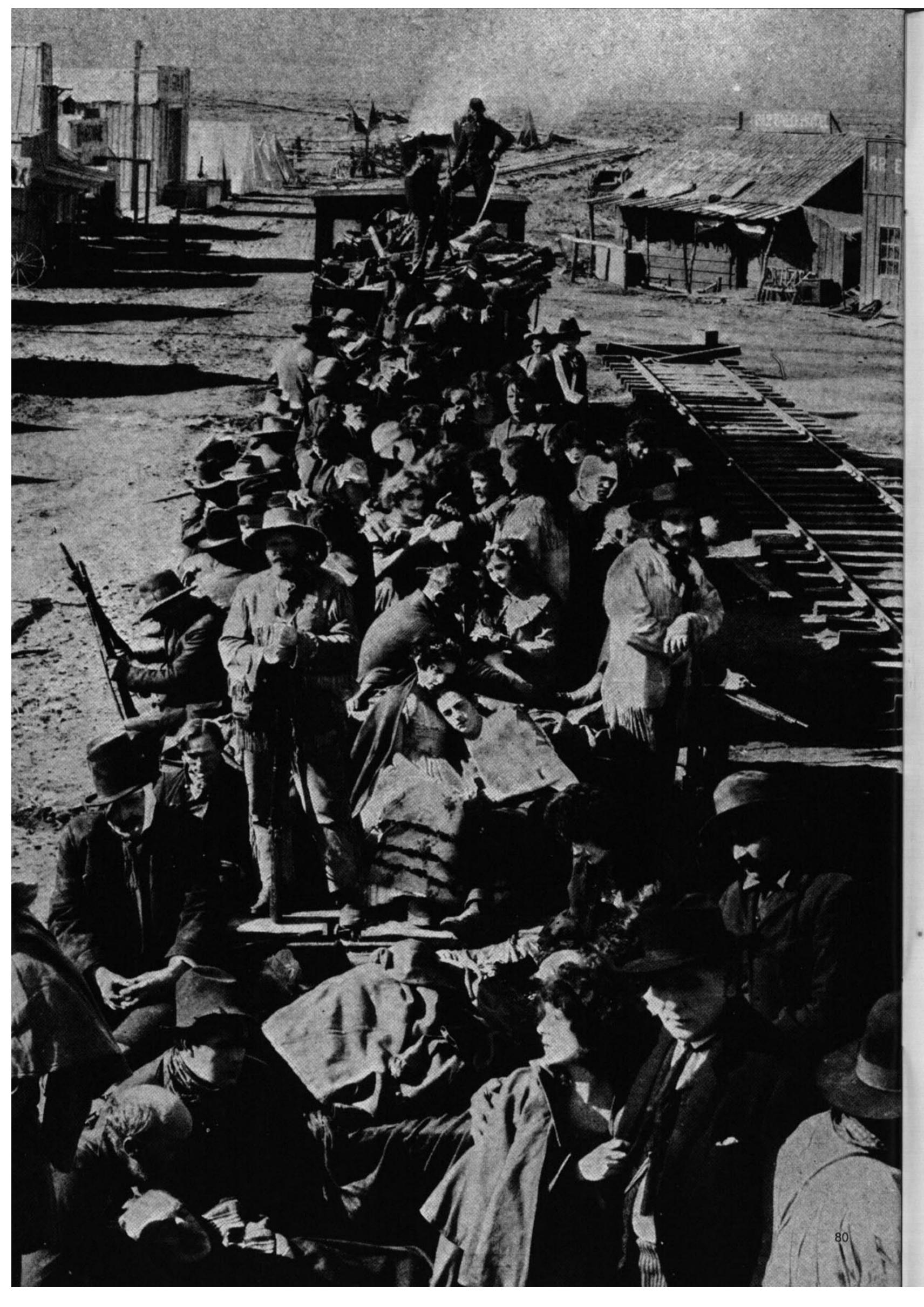

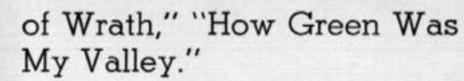

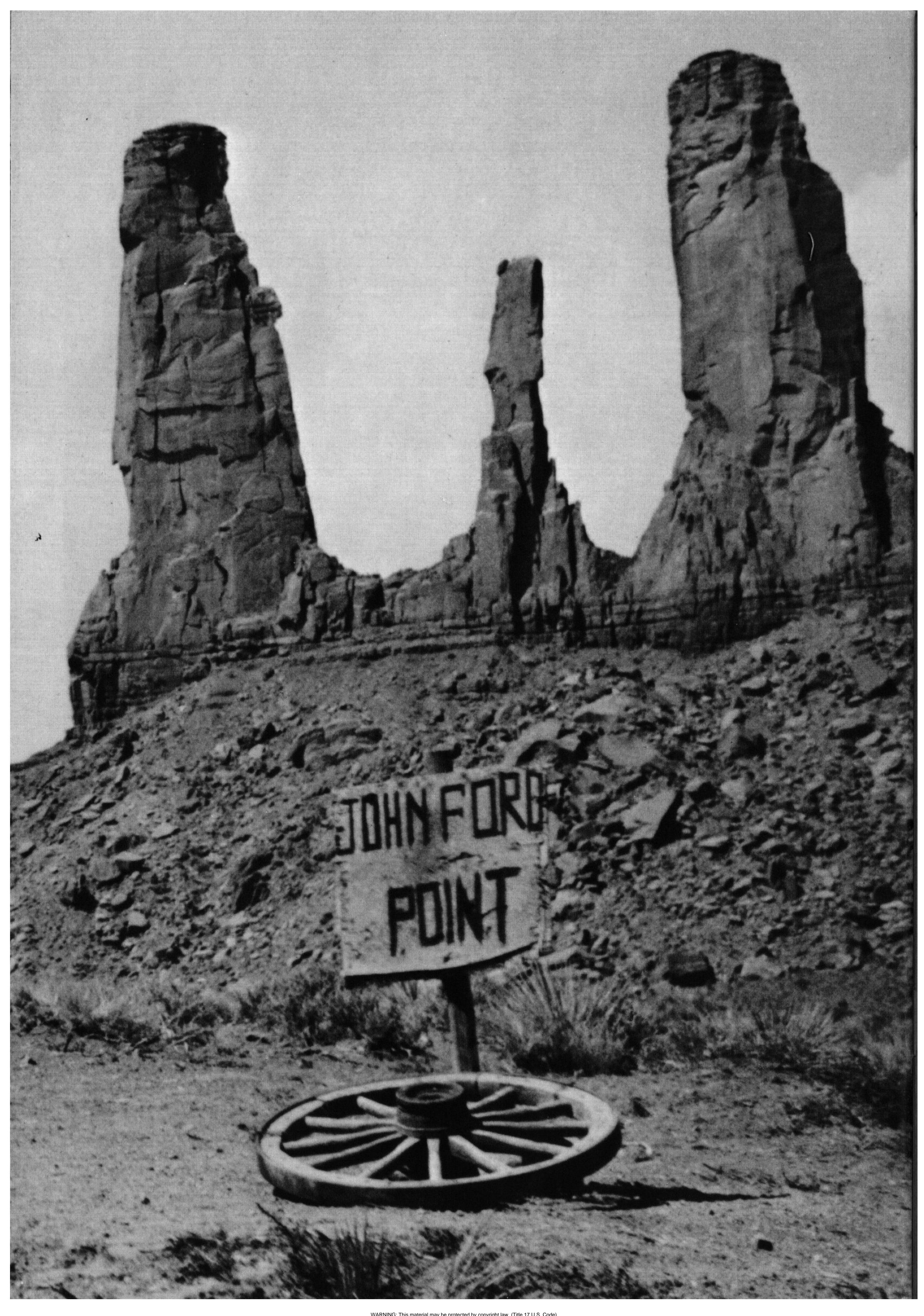
