Kawalerowicz's inclination to structure stories on a precise pattern continued to be a strong characteristic of his work, as did his interest in sets and the symbolic significance of objects. The sophisticated form of his films, the shots composed to focus the viewer's attention on formal beauty, and the structure of his plots left no doubt that Kawalerowicz was aware of contemporary currents in world cinema."
