
Elegy of Life: Rostropovich, Vishnevskaya (*Aleksandra*). No living filmmaker has been more obsessed with the state of the Russian soul than Aleksandr Sokurov. In his viscerally powerful *Alexandra*, this great filmmaker ponders the cost of war. Mother Russia herself, a blunt, grimly humorous babushka (indelibly played by octogenarian opera diva

Galina Vishnevskaya), pays a visit to her grandson's unit in Chechnya. She rides among the young recruits in a troop transport and later, a tank. However incongruous, her tour of inspection through this dusty, sun-bleached landscape has a terrible familiarity. Seldom has a filmmaker so directly addressed his fellow citizens.
