SALOME JENS STARTED

AS A SEX SYMBOL!

Blonde, blue-eyed Salome Jens, who boasts the right kind of measurements, and now gets her biggest screen opportunity to date in Ely Landau's production of "The Fool Killer," starring Anthony Perkins, first gained critical acclaim as a horse.

It was a horse, or more specifically, a fanciful filly in the fantasy-fancy house created by Jean Genet in the play, "The Balcony." That performance led the noted critic Brooks Atkinson to describe her as "incandescent as a 200-watt bulb."

But the odd, off-beat off-Broadway nag role was actually not her first. Chroniclers can be forgiven for forgetting her real first effort. It was in something called "Sixth Finger in a Five-Fingered Glove," which closed right after it opened on Broadway.

Miss Jens, who plays the tender, devoted foster-mother of 12-year-old Edward Albert, a runaway boy, in "The Fool Killer," prepared intensively for the acting career that has already showered her with laurels.

Born on a farm near Milwaukee, Salome began to study the piano at seven, and gave her first recital not long afterwards. During high school, she began a study of the dance-eventually becoming a pulpil of famed Martha Graham.

Then came New York, and intensive study with Miss Graham at the Herbert Berghof drama school. Today, though she has arrived, Salome continues her studies, at the Actors Studio.

Those who can see beyond a beautiful figure have always detected the results of Salome's dedicated study of acting; it was her blend of beauty and skill that first attracted director Servando Gonzalez, who gave her "The Fool Killer" role.

Nevertheless, that sex symbol talk has "disturbed" Salome, she says. Like so many other serious actresses less attractively equipped than she, it's the acting, not the looks, she wants audiences to remember. They doubtless will when they see her in "The Fool Killer."

MADCAP MOVIE MAKING!

True to its fashion, the weather also failed to cooperate with the shooting crew, storming and raining to the chagrin of company and spectators alike. This annoyance, added to other uncontrollable location conditions, such as the sonic boom of low-flying jet aircraft breaking the sound barrier and ruining the soundtrack, plus a lazy flying private plane that insisted upon traversing the immediate filming area, gave the company more than the usual share of snafus.

Star Anthony Perkins demonstrated vividly that he is not the gangling, awkward, oversensitive youth indicated by several of his most recent roles. His rugged characterization of Milo Bogardus gave him the opportunity of acting as his own stunt-man in several scenes demanding athletic ability and a considerable amount of endurance. Stripped for his swimming scene in "The Fool Killer," Perkins was revealed as surprisingly muscular, proving to be a powerful swimmer. Milo Bogardus may be the beginning of a new Tony Perkins.

STRING OF "FIRSTS" FOR "THE FOOL KILLER" The Landau Company's "The

Fool Killer," being distributed through Allied Artists, will probably go down in film history as the movie with the most "firsts" to its credit.

For star Anthony Perkins, it was his first American picture in two years. For director Servando Gonzalez, it was his first American picture after much success in the Mexican film industry. For 12-year-old Edward Albert, son of actor Eddie Albert and actress, Margo, it marked his motion picture debut, and the same applies to 9-year-old Sindee Ann Richards.

"The Fool Killer" is the first picture produced by The Landau Company since "Long Day's Journey Into Night," and it also marked the first film appearance of veteran character actor Henry Hull in eight years.

PRODUCTION NOTES

The filming of Ely Landau's production of "The Fool Killer," which the Landau Releasing Organization is distributing through Allied Artists, was accomplished on location in and around Knoxville, Tennessee. It is replete with such "firsts" as the motion picture debut of the 12-year-old scion of a famous acting family; a torrid "bedroom scene" between two players whose combined ages total 21 years, a pig "extra" who refused the luxury of a mud puddle; the appearance of a Coast Guard patrol boat to rescue the afore-mentioned pig when it daringly began swimming the Tennessee River; and the weather, which still adheres to rules of its own.

After Anthony Perkins was signed for the leading role of Milo Bogardus, a wandering Civil War veteran whose memory had been affected by a war wound, the problem remained of casting the important focal part of young George Mellish, the runaway orphan whom Perkins meets on the road and befriends. Numerous names were suggested, then discarded until Mary Miner, daughter of producer Worthington Miner, offered the name of 12-year-old Edward Albert, son of actor Eddie Albert and actress Margo. A quick test was arranged, with the result that young Edward passed with flying colors. The youngster's role in "The Fool Killer," is no sinecure; he appears in the majority of the scenes so that his work day, under the California law pertaining to acting minors, was broken up into a four-hour work period, a three-hour school session and an hour for recreation. To keep the boy from getting too lonesome during the three-month shooting schedule, his 7-year-old sister, Maria, and his mother Margo

At any rate, a pig-chase sequence appears in the film, calling for an hilarious, wild chase supposedly ending with a glorious romp in a classically muddy puddle. Instead, the first pig and several of its subsequent brothers-in-obstinacy studiously avoided the painfully prepared puddle, instead making a bee-line for the river bank on the other side. One Buster Crabbe-type porker actually made it across the Tennessee River at its widest point. Another failed to navigate the river and had to be rescued by an auxiliary Coast Guard boat, which volunteered rescue work.

The love interest in "The Fool Killer" is supplied in a most able manner by two performers who are making their min debuts in the picture. Included among their other dramatic and humorous scenes, both 12-yearold Edward Albert, and 9-yearold Sindee Ann Richards enjoy their first screen kiss, to say nothing of a "torrid" (!) bedroom sequence. No censorship problems are anticipated.
