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The Birds (1963)

It's Hitchcock's definitive comedy. Think of it that way, as a great, cosmic practical joke, full of ironic dread. The director has always set great store by The Trouble with Harry, but The Birds abounds in just the kind of morbid whimsy that, in Harry, turns coy. The Birds was surely among his most formidable technical challenges, and Hitchcock rose to it with a master's unflustered ease. No film of his is quite so disorienting, either: the bird attacks are all the more menacing because Hitchcock regards them with such bemused detachment. I still remember with pleasure the first shock at the audacity and perfection of the final scene.
