Une petite ville de garnison, au milieu du 19e siècle. Le fusilier Franz Woyzeck va d'occupation en occupation, il s'efforce de se procurer des revenus accessoires afin de faire vivre Marie et son enfant naturel. II rase le capitaine, qui doute de sa morale - »La morale, c'est quand on est moral, vous comprenez.« - et il sert au docteur à des expériences de toutes sortes - »Est-ce qu'il a déjà mangé ses petits pois, Woyzeck, rien que des petits pois, souvenez-vous en!« Hallucinations, visions des choses effroyables qui l'attendent, toutes ces pensées dominent son esprit. Il apporte à Marie l'argent qu'il a gagné, ne regarde pas son enfant, s'en va en toute hâte. Et Marie, dont le coeur se serre, admire de sa fenêtre le gentil tambour-major qui défile à la tête de la musique du régiment. Le soir-même, il est devant sa porte et Marie sera pour lui une proie facile. En cadeau, il lui laisse deux boucles d'oreille de pacotille; Marie s'en pare fièrement devant son petit miroir. L'inconscient Woyzeck ne se doute de rien jusqu'à ce que le capitaine et le docteur se fassent un malin plaisir de lui apprendre la vérité. Woyzeck observe Marie et le tambour-major alors qu'ils sont en train de danser et il n'a plus aucun doute: il fait don de tout ce qu'il possède à son camarade Andres, va chez le Juif et achète un couteau. Le soir, il conduit Marie à l'étang. Il fait nuit, la lune se lève et Woyzeck poignarde Marie. A l'auberge, les gens découvrent qu'il a du sang sur lui et pour laver le sang et pour lancer le couteau encore plus profondément dans l'étang, il avance dans l'eau, toujours plus loin, jusqu'à ce qu'il se noie . . .






A little garrison-town in the middle of the 19th century. The fusilier Franz Woyzeck rushes from work to work, earning some extra money by doing different kinds of jobs to make a living for Marie and his illegitimate child. He acts as shaver for the Captain who doubts his morality – "morality, that is to be moral, does HE understand" – and the doctor experiments on him – "has HE already eaten his peas, Woyzeck, nothing but peas, HE should not forget!"

Delusions, visions of the horror he will be confronted with, control his mind.


He gives Marie his earnings, does not even have a look at his child and hurries away, and Marie, who feels worried, stands at the window admiring the good-looking Drum-Major who heads the regiment orchestra. In the evening he stands in her doorway and she becomes an easy prey. He offers her two cheap ear-rings which Marie proudly tries on in front of her little mirror. Woyzeck suspects nothing until the Captain and the doctor amuse themselves in hinting at the affair.

Woyzeck watches Marie and the Drum-Major dancing and now he is quite certain:

He leaves his personal effects to Andres, his companion and then he goes to the Jew and buys a knife. In the evening he leads Marie to the pond. The night falls, the moon rises and Woyzeck stabs Marie.

Klaus Kinski, born Nikoluas Nakszynski, 1928, in Zoppot near Danzig. Within a few years his parents move to Berlin. Their son attends the secondary school. After his fifth year there, he is placed in a Dutch camp for premilitary training and soon falls into British captivity. Klaus Kinski, as he now calls himself, ("Kinski is short and good"), begins his acting career here. He impersonates a mentally sick person so well to his guards that within a few months he is discharged and sent back to Germany. In retrospect, Kinski is of the opinion that this was his real acting training.

Back in Germany, he receives his first engagements in Tübingen and Baden-Baden. Soon afterwards he is called to Berlin by Boleslaw Barlog. But for the moment Kinski has had enough of theatre. In 1949 he appears in a hall in Jean Coctequ's one act work, "La vois humaine", (The Human Voice). Kinski's solo act runs for 47 performances. The beginner is already regarded as a stage talent. Hereafter success seems to be a matter of course. In the Charlottenburg artists' bar, "Quartier Bohème", Kinski recites verses by Villon and is acclaimed enthusiastically. He expands his repertory to include Rimbaud texts and can already fill the Kongresshalle.

Appearances by Kinski as an interpreter of poetry continue up to the early 1960s. At the same time he is making a name for himself as a film actor. Starting with Helmut Käutner's "Ludwig II", Klaus Kinski has to date appeared in more than 150 films.

WOYZECK

Eva Mattes was born in Munich on 14th December 1954. As early as her schooldays she began to synchronize children's parts for television. At the age of 12 came the first small theatre appearances, and at the age of 16 she is awarded the Federal Film Prize in Gold for the most promising actress of the younger generation in Michael Verhoeven's film "OK". Television and theatre appearances ensue. In 1972 Ivan Nagel places her under contract to the Hamburg Schauspielhaus. In spite of her theatre work, she becomes one of the most important actresses of the "New German Cinema".
