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TOP DOG

A great ball is to be given in a newly-built hotel for the 50th anniversary celebration of a town. Many journalists and TV reporters are to be present and the list of invited guests is stricly limited. It will certainly be quite an ocassion for those providing the entertainment and will lead to rivalry in the choice of top dog. The four best specialists in this field are the main rivals. Ludwik Danielak, the main character, a compère in this thirties, always on the move, running to and fro, arranging minor business and events of secondary importance, does not see any chance for himself to compete for the job of top dog. However, because of certain unforeseen circumstances, he gradually becomes convinced that he should compete, as the ball could provide him with an opportunity to show off his abilities and to gain a better position in life. At first he tries a round-about way of achieving his purpose by seeking the backing of the Town Council but when this fails, he decides to achieve it by hook or by crook and eliminates individual rivals by various foul methods. In the course of his activities, he breaks moral barriers one by one. He uses increasingly foul methods and does not shy away from cutting his best friend, Romek, out of the competition. The news that he has succeeded in achieving his purpose comes unexpectedly from a councillor. Ludwik Danielak leads the dance, applauded loudly by the guests, and receives many congratulations for his splendid performance. Suddently Romek, his friend, appears in the ball-room and slaps his face. He thus gives the punishment not only on behalf of himself but also on behalf of the audience and the director of the film. Perhaps this will make Ludwik aware that the price he has paid in pursuing his aim is much higher than success, that for one dazzling performance as a top dog he has paid with friendship, love and human dignity.
