A milestone of the New Latin American Cinema, Araya is a film which defies definition. Set in Araya, on the Caribbean Coast of Venezuela, whose inhabitants depend exclusevely on what the sea provides - salt and fish - the film has an almost hypnotic visual splendor. Photographed in stark, beautiful black-and-white images, the film creates an unforgettable canvas of the inhabitant's cycle of dependence on the conditions in which nature forces them to live. Like the films of Eisenstein and Flaherty, Araya draws a line between social observation and aesthetic pleasure.
