LOVE, THE MAGICIAN

arlos Saura's flamenco films (Blood Wedding, Carmen) always manage to put a knot in my stomach and bring a lump to my throat. I go hot, I go cold, I shiver out of fear, dread and exhilaration. It's the feet-stomping and rigid steaminess of the gestures that get to me. Love, the Magician, the third in this trilogy, provoked the same kind of physical symptoms. Tragic love, again, is the issue. As children, Candela (Christina Hoyos) and Jose (Juan Antonio Jimenez) were promised in marriage, a gypsy custom. But Carmelo (Antonio Gades) loves Candela and Jose loves Lucia (Laura del Sol), or, at any rate, loved her at the time he was fatally stabbed. Carmelo is jailed for the killing and while he's gone, Candela goes slightly crazy, meeting Jose's apparition nightly for a ghostly pas de deux behind the encampment's garbage dump. Filmed on a sound stage, cleanly and incisively despite the deliberate squalor of the set, Love, the Magician makes no effort to hide its own artifice. There's nothing remotely realistic about choreographed flamenco, all the emotion and action expressed in highly stylized movement. Yet it all seems so real, so primal and genuinely tragic — even to somebody who is skeptical of the intense emotiveness, conservative values and violence. The dancing is, of course, incomparable, but there's a slight problem with casting Hoyos as Gades' lover. She may be a better dancer, but del Sol and Gades make a dynamite couple, the stuff fantasies are made of, as Carmen showed us. (Laemmie's Royal)
