

# film/Video



With support from Champagne Piper-Heidsieck, the British Film Institute last year launched its ambitious Classic Film Collection program, making available to select international institutions optimum-condition prints of historically significant films. Showcasing the British work of one of the cinema's greatest directors, the Early Hitchcock series, on three Thursdays in April, allows audiences to experience these films with all the subtlety and visual detail originally intended.

Bon Voyage (1944) **Murder** (1930) Thursday, April 8

Returning to England from Hollywood in 1944, Hitchcock joined in the war effort with the short, Bon Voyage, featuring a cast of Free French actors in exile and played in French. The story concerns a British officer escaping from France with a Polish officer, later revealed to be a Gestapo agent. (In French, with English subtitles; 26 mins.) Followed by Murder, described by the director as his "first and only whodunit," a stylish excursion into London's theatrical underworld. (94 mins.)

Rich and Strange (1932) **Sabotage** (1936) Thursday, April 22

A lightly acid tone runs through *Rich* and Strange (aka East of Shanghai), which follows a perfect suburban couple as they venture out to see the world. Critically ignored in its time, it's since won praise for revealing, according to one British critic, "a toughness and irony which Hitchcock has not always achieved since." (81 mins.) Suggested by a Joseph Conrad novel, Sabotage is a remarkably ruthless thriller, at once evoking the terror of urban anarchy and hinting at the impending German onslaught —according to critic Raymond Durgnat, "the profoundest film of Hitchcock's thriller period, and perhaps of his career." With Sylvia Sidney and Oscar Homolka. (77 mins.)


### Aventure Malgache (1944) Secret Agent (1936) Thursday, April 29

Featuring the same actors as Bon Voyage and, like it, a wartime propaganda effort, Aventure Malgache centers on a young French lawyer organizing the Resistance in Madagascar. (In French, with English subtitles; 31 mins.). Starring John Gielgud, Peter Lorre, Robert Young, and Madeline Carroll, Secret Agent is a comedic thriller based on Somerset Maugham's Ashenden, set in Switzerland during WWI, and filled with vintage Hitchcockian "atmosphere." (85 mins.)

# **Area Premieres**

### Guncrazy

(Tamra Davis, 1992) Friday-Saturday, April 23-24 Special screening times: 7 & 9 pm

One of the most debated independent features of the year, Guncrazy showcases the talents of America's erstwhile sweetheart, Drew Barrymore, a misunderstood white trash outcast in love with recent parolee James LeGros. After murdering her mother's sleazy boyfriend (Warhol immortal Joe Dallesandro), the two take to the road, becoming the most recent incarnation of the venerable movie tradition of the outlaw couple on the road. Suggested by the same-named B-movie classic of the 1940s, first time director Tamra Davis's Guncrazy is at the center of the current girls-with-guns phenomenon, and is as filled with edgy violence as quirky, unexpected sadness. (93 mins.)

Manufacturing Consent: Noam Chomsky and the Media (Mark Achbar/Peter Wintonick, 1992) Friday-Saturday, April 30-May 1

Funny, provocative, and highly accessible, Manufacturing Consent (by Canadian directors Mark Achbar and Peter Wintonick) explores the political life and ideas of Noam Chomsky, the acclaimed linguist, intellectual, and political activist. A mammoth, two-part project, the film is nonetheless light on its feet, encouraging viewers to question the film's workings even as they watch. Part one focuses on thought control in modern societies; in part two, Chomsky argues that we have to undertake "a course of intellectual self-defense" in order to give meaning to the democratic process. Shown to record-breaking audiences across the country, Manufacturing Consent holds up a mirror to the media, and ultimately to the audience as well. Both parts will be shown each evening. (Part one: 70 mins.; part two: 95 mins.)

### Vera

(Sergio Toledo, 1987) Wednesday, April 14

An emotionally complex film from Brazil, Vera tells the extraordinary tale of a young woman attempting to survive after leaving a home for unwanted children. The major obstacle: she believes she is a man trapped in a woman's body. Tormented by her sexual confusion, she meets the independent and sophisticated Clara, and the two form an unusual alliance. Starring Beatriz Nogueria; directed by Sergio Toledo. (In Spanish, with English subtitles; 87 mins.)

### Barroco

(Paul Leduc, 1989) Saturday, April 17

Shown here in 1991 to considerable interest, Mexican director Paul Leduc's Barroco is a one-of-a-kind work described by one critic as "Marquez meets Fellini." The visually lush film is inspired by Alejo Carpentier's Concierto Barroco, and, using the language of music, offers a poetic history of 500 years of Latin American and Caribbean culture through its encounters with native populations, Spanish colonialists, and African slaves. Structured like a concerto in four movements, Barroco is a spectacle speaking literally louder than words. (In Spanish, with English subtitles; 108 mins.)

### New Television Update

This year marks the second season on the PBS national schedule for New Television, and the first season in which the Wexner Center joins flagship PBS stations WGBH/Boston and WNET/New York as a producing partner for this series of innovative video productions. The series' spring line-up, which the Wexner Center media arts staff participated in planning and selecting, begins with a portrait of M. F. K. Fisher, completed shortly before her death in 1992. The program captures the 81year-old writer's views on love, writing, and eating, ultimately illuminating her life-long theme: what feeds us? M. F. K. Fisher airs Wednesday, April 28, at 10:30 pm on PBS; check local listings for WOSU-TV's playdate for this and subsequent New Television broadcasts.

Subsequent programs on the spring schedule include **Devices of De**tachment, a poetic look at the power of language in politically torn Northern Ireland; Step Across the Border, a documentary about new musician Fred Frith on the road between Zurich and Tokyo; and Homage by Assassination, an autobiographical essay by Palestinian-American filmmaker Elia Suleiman, depicting his growing alienation from the world during the course of the Gulf War. Future New Television presentations will include several works post-produced in the Wexner Center's Art & Technology facility.

# Visiting Artist

Steve Fagin Zero Degrees Latitude (1993) Friday, April 2

San Diego-based video artist Steve

Fagin's latest work, Zero Degrees Latitude, is a timely, challenging, and characteristically unorthodox look at the so-called "new conquest" of Latin America by U.S. interests of various orders. The piece focuses specifically on the religious evangelization of the indigenous peoples of Ecuador in both the Andes highlands and the Amazon basin, and argues that "modernization" of this kind (involving a specific North American belief system) abets the disintegration of the tribal systems that had bonded the indigenous peoples into communities. Including remarkable verité footage of the region and highly stylized studio sequences, Zero Degrees Latitude (scheduled for PBS broadcast on New Television later this year) was post-produced in the -Wexner Center's Art & Technology facility, where Fagin has been a resident artist for extended periods in 1992 and 1993, with support from the Wexner Center Foundation. A professor in the visual arts department at the University of California, San Diego, Fagin has exhibited his videos worldwide; his The Machine That Killed Bad People was featured in the Wexner Center's presentation of 1991's Passages de l'image, and he contributed to the Breakthroughs: Avant-Garde Artists in Europe and America, 1950–1990 volume, published by the Wexner Center and Rizzoli. (Program: approximately 90 mins.)


