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Against The Grain

Burns is a 34-year old Australian who uses a jagged, disjunctive film vocabulary based on extreme close-ups and sudden camera movements. His narrative — solitary terrorist detonates a smoke bomb in Sydney, then goes underground, all the while tracked by a government computer-video rig — is secondary to his digressions, which include pastiches of Susan Sontag's On Photography, tracts on sexist advertising, and a diatribe against Australia's uranium industry. Intercut with tinted newsreels and scored to a paranoid buzz of news reports and indigenous punk. Against The Grain is replete with geopolitical references (West Germany, Northern Ireland, Vietnam, Italy, East Timor). Despite, or rather because of this chaos, Against The Grain achieves a potent immediacy — it's like a cross between Newsreel's America 1969, Godard's Numero Deux and B-movies' The Offenders — with a jolting style that keeps you working and thinking throughout. - J.
