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
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**Asphalt**

The long opening sequence is one of the most evocative ever filmed - the Potsdamer Platz, with store and traffic lights blazing, workers going home and late shoppers sauntering by; and it is followed by another long sequence in which the prostitute-thief heroine (Betty Amann) seeks to prevent the upright young cop (Gustav Fröhlich) from sending her to jail' - David Shipman.
