THE FILMS OF HOWARD HAWKS SPECIAL MATINEE DOUBLE FEATURE A GIRL IN EVERY PORT, 4:30**

A favorite among the French critics who first recognized Hawks's importance. A GIRL IN EVERY PORT is of interest as Hawks's first clear presentation of his major theme of male friendship (it's a kind of love story of two sailors), and also for the incendiary presence of Louise Brooks playing a circus high diver who becomes involved with Victor McLaglen. Hawks's current project is an updated remake of this film. (1928, 65 mins, 35mm)

PLUS, FAZIL

A long-unseen Hawks' silent (with synchrynous sound effects and music): Charles Farrell, Greta Nissen and Mae Busch star in an exotic romance which tells of a tragic love affair between a French girl and an Arabian prince. The setting shifts from Europe to the desert. Beautifully directed in a gauze-lensed, lush style more like Borzage's than Hawks', which might explain Hawks' dismissal of this truly perfect example of late-silent studio craftsmanship in a popular escapist genre.
