BRIEF OUTUNE OF PLOT (Information in brakets NOT FOR PUBLICATION)

Stephen Franklin, in his last term at school, lives within sight of the Malvern Hills where his father is a local rector. Throughout the play we witness Stephen's gradual awakening and awareness of the forces around him. He begins to acknowledge his sexual ambivalence, to recognise his deep-rooted antipathy for the kind of organisation represented by his school and the cadet-corps and to question the established view of Christian teaching. Stephen's moral world-outlock' changes radically throughout the play but his absorption with the music of Elgar and his fascination with Penda, England's last pagan king, remain constant. The play makes a striking and elaborate use of imagery to convey the series of experinces which confront Stephen and which force him to make choices which will affect his future life.

The film is written by David Rudkin. It will be shot entirely on location around the Malvern Hills (during Weeks 25 to 29) and directed by Alan Clarke.
