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Three meddlesome businessmen set out to find suitable husbands for a dead friend's widow and her comely daughter, and make a wonderful mess of things. That modest plot is all you need to know of Late Autumn, another masterful human comedy made in 1960 by Japan's Yasujiro Ozu (of Tokyo Story), whose work was virtually unknown in the West until after his death. For the uninitiated, an Ozu film may seem as slow-paced and special, at first glance, as a Japanese tea ceremony. But have patience. "It's people who tend to complicate life . . . life itself is simple," is Ozu's timeless message, expressed here as usual with unfailing humor and transcendent poetic truth.
