



### **PRODUCTION INFORMATION**

Above the Rim is a powerful and fast-paced film about the influence two disparate men (Leon, Tupac Shakur) wield over dazzling high school basketball player Kyle-Lee Watson (Duane Martin). Running with one man places Kyle on a

dangerous fast track of cash and notoriety, while the other offers a chance to go to college and play pro ball.

Starring an ensemble cast featuring Duane Martin (The Inkwell), Leon (Cliffhanger), Tupac Shakur (Poetic Justice), Marlon Wayans (Mo' Money), Tonya Pinkins, Bernie Mac (House Party 3), Eric Nies (MTV), and David Bailey, Above the Rim was directed, co-written and produced by Jeff Pollack. James D. Brubaker served as Executive Producer of the film which was produced by Benny Medina and co-written by Barry Michael Cooper (New Jack City, Sugar Hill).

Inspired by outdoor basketball tournaments which originated from Rucker's

Playground in Harlem, Above the Rim is set against the fiercely competitive asphalt courts where pick-up games are proving grounds for amateurs and professionals alike.

Kyle-Lee Watson (Duane Martin) is a high-school basketball star who seeks to parlay his athletic prowess into a one-way ticket to the NBA. Tempered by his strong-willed and protective single mother Mailika Williams (Tonya Pinkins), Kyle is warned that his future shouldn't depend on the game. But he becomes increasingly frustrated when top college scouts target him, but don't immediately offer a spot on their team.

# As his final season winds to a close, Kyle feels the pressure to perform,

leading him to grandstand in hopes of impressing a visiting recruiter from Georgetown University. While his one-man show alienates his teammates and

coach, it's a masterpiece to Bugaloo (Marlon Wayans). Bugaloo, Kyle's best friend,

introduces him to Birdie (Tupac Shakur), a drug-dealer who is busy assembling a team to compete in the neighborhood Shoot Out -- a prestigious street basketball tournament that awards bragging rights and community respect to the champions. Intrigued by Birdie's connections and ability to quickly propel Kyle's career, he abandons his school-sponsored Shoot Out squad to run instead with The

### Birdmen.

Proud of his prized catch, Birdie woos his newest protege with finesse, showering the impressionable athlete with promises of fame, gifts, women, cash and more if he helps win the tournament. Ultimately, this new relationship will test Kyle's deeply rooted values. In the ensuing days, Kyle's mother begins her own relationship when she

meets Shep (Leon). Shep is on the rebound. Once a living legend of the playground

courts, he deserted his family and skipped town to escape overwhelming feelings of

guilt after his best friend's accidental death. Now, years later, Shep has returned

home and taken a job as a security guard at Kyle's high school. Seeing aspects of himself in the young athlete, he hopes to steer Kyle away from the destructive influences he sees in Birdie.

Kyle, who shuns subtle advice from Shep, discourages his mother from getting involved with the "toy cop." As Mailika and Shep grow closer, Kyle pries into Shep's mysterious past. What he discovers shocks him. Not only was Shep a star on the rise who fell from grace, he is also Birdie's estranged brother. In a climactic confrontation between the two men, Kyle warns Shep to stay clear of his mother. Unable to escape the demons plaguing his past, Shep decides to quit his job and

### again leave town - but this time for good.

As Kyle prepares for the Shoot-Out, he learns the price of running with a

gangsta. He finds out Birdie killed Flip (Bernie Mac), an innocent homeless man

who picked a fight with Kyle. Stunned by this act of senseless brutality and afraid of

Birdie's violent temper, he re-teams with his original Shoot-Out squad just in time

for the tournament.

As the competition whittles down to the championship game, The Birdmen are pitted against Kyle's team, The Bombers. From the tip-off, it's evident the match is going to be an uneven and overtly physical grudge match. As the second half of

the game proceeds, Kyle's team is being badly beaten.

When the game seems hopelessly lost, Shep, who decides not to let history

repeat itself, appears from the crowd and suits up to join The Bombers. With Shep's

addition, the game slowly turns around and The Bombers catch up. In the final

seconds, Shep passes off to Kyle who stuffs the game-winning basket. Furious about losing, Birdie seeks revenge and orders one of his posse to kill

Kyle. As a gun is pulled from a courtside dufflebag, Shep dives in front of Kyle and takes the bullet.

In the end, Birdie becomes the target of a hit himself and Kyle goes on to

play at Georgetown, watched on national television by his closest admirers - his

mother, Coach Rollins ... and Shep.

Ultimately, Above the Rim exposes the turbulent climate that transforms

intimidation on the streets into domination on the courts, as young men turn to

basketball to escape their all too violent surroundings.

### **BEHIND THE SCENES**

### When Dr. James Naismith invented basketball in 1891, he never imagined

### his sport would one day become a multi-billion dollar business. Today, basketball is

host to world-renowned players and coaches who command seven-figure paychecks.

But fame and fortune were never motivators to Naismith or the late Holcombe

Rucker, whose legacy inspired real-life shoot-out tournaments like the one depicted in Above the Rim.

Keeping inner-city kids away from trouble was Rucker's passion. A recreation supervisor for the Department of Parks in New York City, Rucker formed a Summer basketball league in the early 1950's that catered to all levels of

play -- from novice to professional. When he died at age 38 of cancer, the

interborough league he started was named in his honor, as was the playground

where much of the movie was filmed -- a fitting tribute to a man who perhaps more

than anyone else in the last century emulated the pure spirit Naismith intended

when he gave birth to the game.

Located at 155th Street and 8th Avenue, Rucker's Playground has been the

heart of street basketball for the past 40 years. In the 60's and 70's, it served as an

unofficial training camp for some of the greatest stars the sport has ever witnessed.

From Julius "Dr. J" Erving and Wilt Chamberlain to Kareem Abdul Jabbar and

Mike Riordan, notable pros the world round converged on Harlem every Summer to hold court and mix their skills with the unbelievably talented pick-up players at

Rucker's.

"If you ask anyone who knows anything about the game, they'll tell you that

in the 60's and 70's the best basketball in the country was played in the Summer at

Rucker's, after the NBA season had ended," explains Jeff Pollack, director, co-writer

and producer of Above the Rim.

Professional athletes returning to the playground to compete against vastly

superior amateurs was a fertile and fast-paced scenario for Pollack, who wanted to

# make a movie about "a guy who comes from nowhere and is better than anybody

else."

### To assist with the film, the production hired technical advisors like Richard

### "Pee-Wee" Kirkland, a legend of the Rucker leagues. Kirkland never played

professional ball but is fondly remembered by players like Kareem Abdul Jabbar,

who called him the best point guard he ever went up against.

Nate "Tiny" Archibald, a fourteen season veteran of the NBA, also recalled Kirkland's caliber of play. "I used to go up against Pee-Wee on the streets and in the playgrounds. He was one of the best there ever was," Archibald said. "His problem was that along with being smart, he was a street warrior too. When Chicago offered him a contract, he just laughed in their face and said, 'Hey, I could make more money in a couple of days out on the street," Archibald remembered. To this day, aficionados of street basketball talk about the hot afternoon when Kirkland and Joe Hammond, one of the film's featured playground players, squared off against a team of famed professionals including Dr. J. In many ways,

Above the Rim chronicles the lives of men like Hammond and Kirkland, Pollack believes.

"What we've tried to do is make a movie about how life and basketball can

become intertwined," Pollack explains. "For many, basketball is the only way out. And that's not just true in New York. It's the same in Detroit, Chicago, Philadelphia -- any basketball hot bed, you name it. For every guy who becomes a star, there are 50 more who are just as talented and don't make it. Some of them have 130 IQ's and are flipping burgers. This is a film about what happens to these guys -- the ones who make it and those who don't." For Duane Martin, who stars as Kyle in Above the Rim, the film hits close to home. "It's amazing how much this story parallels my life," Martin said. "Here I am, a kid from Brownsville, New York with a basketball scholarship to New York

### University. That was an incredible gift to me not only athletically, but also

academically. When I signed my one-year deal with the New York Knicks, I knew

that anything I set out to do from that point on would be possible." When he left the

Knicks, he turned to acting. "It's pretty ironic, here I am back where I began in New

York City, starring in a movie about basketball. How's that for a strange twist of fate?"

To bolster the film's authenticity, Kirkland and Pollack tapped into the best of the current playground hustlers. In all, more than 70 were cast to complete the crucial shoot-out tournament sequence. "At least 95% of the guys we hired had the

moves, talent and ability to make it to Division One college ball and they weren't

ever able to get there. They were qualified to play but were disqualified by socio-

economic forces before they were even given a chance," Pollack says.

Nowhere are those social dynamics more visible than in Harlem, where the desperation of the inner-city provides a graphic and telling backdrop for Above the Rim.

Because such harsh realities have always hung heavily over Harlem, Rucker's dream was to bring big-name ball players back to the ghetto to offer children influential contact with appropriate role models; living personalities who could both

inspire and motivate them to improve their lives. When Above the Rim began setting

up its caravan of wardrobe trailers and production vehicles on October 18, 1993,

hundreds of excited neighborhood children would wait patiently, sometimes for

hours, just for a shot at an autograph, a glimpse of the cast or a chance for a brief

one-on-one with one of their idols.

Noted Tupac Shakur, who plays Birdie in the film, "Children have the power

to do anything they want, but they have to be inspired so they can aspire. They need

self worth. They need positive influences in their lives to mold their future. I spoke

with a lot of the kids out here and they're hungry. Hungry for hope. Maybe these few

# days of shooting (in Harlem) will change some young man or young woman's life. I

hope so."

**ABOUT THE CAST** 

DUANE MARTIN makes his motion picture starring debut in Above the Rim

playing Kyle-Lee Watson, a high school basketball star who is torn between the competing influences of a drug dealer and a legendary local athlete who returns

home to face his beleaguered past.

No stranger to basketball, Martin ranked among the top-20 college players in

the nation when he starred as a point guard on the New York University team. He

later signed a one-year contract with the New York Knicks, but turned to acting after his deal was terminated.

Martin caught his first major break in Ron Shelton's White Men Can't Jump,

portraying one of the final twosome that Woody Harrelson and Wesley Snipes battle

against on the basketball court. For his next project, he stars in Matty Rich's The

Inkwell.

Among his television credits, Martin received a Daytime Emmy Award

nomination for his starring role in the CBS Schoolbreak Special "Different Worlds:

A Story of Interracial Love." He was a series regular in NBC's "Out All Night," for

which the <u>Daily Variety</u> chose him as a break-out star for the year for the '92-'93

season. The network then offered him a development deal to star in and co-produce

a sit-com for TriStar Television.

LEON stars as Shep, a former basketball star who tries to come to terms with

his life while confronting the demons of his past in Above the Rim.

Most recently, Leon starred as Derrice Bannock in the hit film Cool Runnings

### and as the villainous Kinnette in Cliffhanger, making him the top billing African-

American actor for 1993. He also starred as J.T., Robert Townsend's womanizing

### brother in The Five Heartbeats

Although Leon has been acting for less than a decade, he has accumulated an impressive list of motion picture and television credits. He made his feature film debut as Fortune Smith, Matt Dillon's best friend in *The Flamingo Kid*. Other highlights of his motion picture career include featured roles in *All the Right Moves*, *Band of the Hand, Colors*, and *Street Walkin'*.

On television, Leon starred in the mini-series "The Women of Brewster

Place" and was featured in the Emmy Award-winning "A Mother's Courage: The

Mary Thomas Story," and "The Father Clements Story." His realistic portrayal of a

basketball player who falls prey to drug addiction in "Midnight Caller" garnered him the Scott Newman Drug Abuse Award.

He gained widespread notoriety as the saintly statue who comes to life in

Madonna's provocative music video, "Like A Prayer."

TUPAC SHAKUR stars as Birdie, a notorious drug dealer whose grip of

power and promise of fame entices an impressionable young athlete in Above the Rim.

Best known to millions as rap star 2Pac, Shakur broke into feature films in Ernest Dickerson's *Juice*. Last year he received critical praise for his portrayal of Lucky, Janet Jackson's love interest in John Singleton's *Poetic Justice*. *Above the Rim* is Shakur's third feature film.

A former member of the successful hip-hop group Digital Underground, Shakur's current album "Strictly 4 My N.I.G.G.A.Z" (Never Ignorant Getting Goals Accomplished) is a platinum seller with two top-10 singles. His controversial

### recording debut "2Pacalypse Now" has sold more than 450,000 copies worldwide.

Shakur began acting when he was 13 years-old, performing in "A Raisin In

The Sun" at the legendary Apollo Theater. He is a former student of Baltimore

High School of Performing Arts.

BERNIE MAC turns in his first dramatic performance in the role of Flip Johnson, a homeless man who plays a mean game of basketball in *Above the Rim*. Mac is best known for his standing ovation performances on such late night comedy series as "Russell Simmons Def Comedy Jam" on HBO and "The Arsenio
