Griffith and C.B. DeMille. With the use of parallel stories, one biblical and one set in World War I, it evokes *Intolerance* and *Sodom und Gomorrah* — films directed by Curtiz in the early twenties. Costello and O'Brien play both pairs of star-crossed lovers at the outbreak of the war, and in the sin-filled days before the Great Flood. Contemporary critics found the dialogue sequences a trifle over-written, and Costello's voice was said to ''detract from the power of her silent acting'', but there is no denying the majesty of the sets and the sweep of the spectacle. Hal Mohr, the original cinematographer, refused to shoot the flood sequence fearing that the giant columns would collapse and injure the cast. His replacement, Barney McGill, used vast quantities of water to flood the set, and several extras, reportedly, were drowned.
