

First French entry of note to date this year, "A Royal Affair" in addition to the sure-fire attraction of Maurice Chevalier is also a gay, saucy, risqué and very delightful comedy that packs much bubbling merriment all the time, whether Monsieur Paris is involved or when the other characters are having their moments.


It is light, frothy stuff with plenty of those touches, absent of late, that cause the eyebrows to lift and evoke hearty response. To briefly rate "A Royal Affair, it's a top comedy in the French manner. It's good for a long, monetary haul. can make light of what might elsewhere be considered questionable themes and subject matter, is once again most tastefully and satirically delineated here.

With his familiar verve and spirited application. Chevalier plays as a king of a place called Cerdania who visits France and during the course of his stay meets up with a former mistress who is at the moment in process of changing hands a few times from the Prime Minister to a Senator, has a rendezvous with her, and later spends an amorous night with the wife of an ambitious politician whose net gain at the conclusion is a cabinet post.

The entire proceedings are played for gags and laughs with sudden surprises and a general air of frivolity. It's a good show and it's going to be around for some time. Chevalier sings, too.

Maurice Chevalier Starred In "A ROYAL AFFAIR"

Maurice made his American debut with the Ziegfield Follies in 1929. He had an act of his own in that fabulous show called Songs from My Repertoire. is essentially the act he brought back to New York in 1947. The theatrical census of 1929 doesn't record how many people saw and heard him then. Box office experts declare that no less than 75,000 thronged the Henry

Chevalier's first and perhaps most memorable film was "THE INNOCENT OF PARIS," "THE LOVE PARADE" quickly made Chevalier's out-thrust lip, the straw hat and cane and engaging strut popular with American moviegoers. "THE BIG PONG," "THE SMIL-ING LIEUTENANT" and "FOLIES BERG. were other film vehicles in which Chevalier scintillated before he came o Broadway in 1934 to do a one-man show for Charles Dillingham. He faced the Hollywood cameras for the last ne in 1935, this time as Prince Danilo in "THE MERRY WIDOW," then returned to France to found the Actors Hospital and be made a Knight of the After the war, he came out of retire-

mentd appeared at the ABC Music Hall in Paris, where the tumultous acclaim which greeted his return proved he was still the idol of the French Capital. He recently completed a successful tour of Belgium and Scandinavia and made his first post-war appearance at Henry Millers Theatre where he achieved a tremendous success with his one-man show. He returned to France where he made his first post-war film — Rene Clair's "GOLDEN SILENCE." Another successful tour followed in England and Belgium. His latest film a "A ROYAL AFFAIR" (LE ROI) completed last year, marks his return to musical comedy.

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
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
