Considered his masterpiece, this was Dovzhenko's fourth, and last, silent film.

The simple story in this film, twice included as one of the Twelve Best Films of All Time by an International panel of critics, concerns the coming of a collective farm to a Ukrainian village; however, Dovzhenko is not interested in the plot, but rather in his belief that the land is the stem of the life-cycle of man. Constant juxtaposition results in an overpowering effect.
