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

This unforgettable and immensely powerful political allegory from the Ukraine was directed by Yuri Illienko—virtuoso cinematographer for the legendary Sergei Paradjanov—and based on Paradjanov's own prison camp experiences. Opening in mid-flight, **Swan Lake The Zone** follows a gaunt escapee finding refuge inside a claustrophobic hammer and sickle monument. A woman takes pity on him and they fall in love, but he is betrayed by her son and returned to the hellish gulag where

life becomes increasingly more bizarre. Illienko's themes of captivity and escape, love and betrayal, surrender and sacrifice are dealt with in an extraordinary visual display. The soundtrack has virtually no dialogue, but
