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ZABRISKIE POINT USA, 1969; color, 110 minutes

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David Thomson called this film Antonioni's "most beautiful inspection of emptiness." A college radical (Mark Frechette) kills a cop, steals a plane, makes love to a girl (Daria Halprin) in Death Valley, and dies in L.A. The director is clearly seduced by the sun- and wind-scoured widescreen landscape in which he positions human beings as though they and their goods existed only to be desert decor, anachronistic artifacts from another time. In the film's final, silent, repeated explosions, Antonioni celebrates the end of the world, like some cinematic shaman welcoming the void.
