Monterey Pop (Dir. D.A. Pennebaker; photography, Richard Leacock, Albert Maysles, D.A. Pennebaker, others; 1968, 82 min.) PERFORMERS: Otis Redding, the Mamas & the Papas, the Who, Janis Joplin with Big Brother & the Holding Company, Jimi Hendrix, Country Joe & the Fish, Scott MacKensie, Hugh Masakela, Canned Heat, Jefferson Airplane, the Animals and Ravi Shankar.

The first great pop festival, the first great festival film. Of the star performers, three of the greatest are dead; of all the groups, only the Who survive in their original form. In other words, you see 'em here or, for the most part, you don't see 'em at all. Janis' Monterey performance of "Ball and Chain" is the acknowledged highlight, it was also the finest recording she ever made. (The look on Mama Cass' face when Janis stomps off stage is worth the price of admission alone.)
