## VANITY FAIR

SOVIET PRIZE-WINNER.—The latest Soviet film to be released here in America is The Youth of Maxim, which shared first prize with Chapayev in the Moscow Cinema Festival last winter. The first of a trilogy, it shows the early steps in the transition of a typical Russian factory laborer, from a rather dull-witted, irresponsible boy into an alert and conscientious social revoluionary. The photography is, as always in hese Soviet films, a magnificent study in realism; and the acting is characterized by that really terrible sincerity-and terrible in the sense awe-inspiring which cannot help but be impressive. The film has a unity of form and emotion which distinguish it from the rather helter-skelter effect of some of the other recent Soviet imports. The prologue is particularly wel mo done, with its swift, flashing shots of a Ne Me Year's Eve celebration in the Russia of other days.
