The Long Goodbye Although this updating of Chandler angered many purists, its daring formal departures (unorthodox and virtually continuous camera movements, ingenious permutations and fragmentations of the title tune) and hallucinatory performances (Mark Rydell, Sterling Hayden, Henry Gibson) make this one of Altman's most remarkable achievements to date. It is also the definitive LA movie, reproducing the experience of that city structurally in its nightmarish labyrinth of dislocations. USA 1973/Dir Robert Altman.



Mon-Fri 12-16 Jan 2.00 daily Nashville Working from a Joan Tewkesbury blueprint, Altman's first epic distributes his inter-actions among two dozen talented actors whom he shuffles and deals like playing cards, using a country music milieu as an imaginary meeting ground for show business and politics. Once again, instincts are greater than ideas . . .but a thousand-odd effects are still orchestrated into a contemporary panorama that is never less than dazzling.
