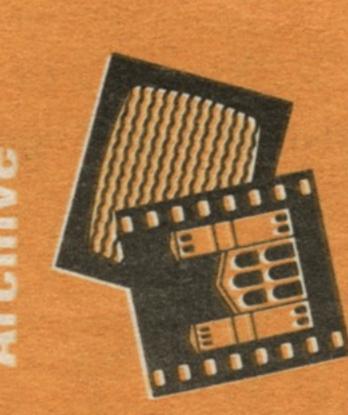

The Bitter Tears of Petra von Kant

s the extraordinarily prolific frontrunner of the '70s New German Cinema movement, Rainer Werner Fassbinder (1945-1982) established a reputation as a prodigy, an iconoclast and a tyrant—a reputation that his untimely death from too much work and too many drugs did nothing to change. But since then, his films have endured and largely transcended this reputation. Accordingly, our retrospective pays tribute to Fassbinder's indelible impression upon the cinema.

In over 40 films, he masterfully blended soap opera, sexual politics, German history, sharp social satire, brilliant subversions of Hollywood genres, and homages to filmmakers like Samuel Fuller and especially Douglas Sirk. This blend is revealed in the pseudonym Fassbinder used as editor of many of his early films: Franz Walsch. "Franz" is for Franz Biberkopf, the protagonist of "Berlin Alexanderplatz," Fassbinder's favorite book, and "Walsch" is for Raoul Walsh, Fassbinder's favorite Hollywood director (until his discovery of Sirk).

After making two shorts, Fassbinder worked in the theater, ultimately helping to establish the experimental troupe, antiteater (or anti-theater). It was with this collective that he first began making feature films at an astonishing rate—eleven films in 1969 and 1970. As the group dissolved, Fassbinder discovered the films of Douglas Sirk and turned towards a more melodramatic style. Except for another cycle of more overtly experimental and political films between 1975 and 1979, this style would grow to encompass a sort of women's history of 20th-century Germany—until QUERELLE, his last film which points in yet another direction.

Throughout his career, a preeminent goal was to expose for middle-class audiences the destructive repercussions of unexamined values and the underlying "sentimental idealism" that nourishes more overt evils like fascism and racism. As he put it, "The best thing I can think of would be to create a union between something as beautiful and powerful and wonderful as Hollywood films and a criticism of the status quo. That's my dream, to make such a German film-beautiful and extravagant and fantastic."

WHITY

A fascinating and sordid tale set in the American Southwest of 1878, about a mixed-race servant whose father is also his employer and whose mother is the family cook. After his singer/prostitute girlfriend Hanna prompts him to resist his oppression, the formerly obsequious Whity murders the decadent ranching family that has abused him. Although he escapes with Hanna, their future is as bleak as the desert they seek to cross. Unlike much of his other early films, WHITY already shows Fassbinder's love of Hollywood melodrama in its use of stylized performance. Fassbinder wrote the film for lead actor Günther Kaufmann, the black German with whom he was madly in love.

## BEWARE OF A HOLY WHORE (Warnung vor einer heiligen Nutte)

This self-critical (and extremely funny) film fictionalizes the problems Fassbinder had while filming WHITY. In a Spanish resort a gloomy, bored German film crew awaits the arrival of the movie's director and star. In the meantime, they whine, get drunk, exploit, seduce, and brutalize each other. When the director finally appears, he finds sheer chaos and must struggle to get the film underway. Although the film they are making deals with state-sanctioned violence, the troupe is ironically unable to transcend the petty violence that characterizes their own relationships. This disillusionment marks the end of the collaborative spirit of the antiteater phase of Fassbinder's career.

### THE BITTER TEARS OF **PETRA VON KANT** (Die bitteren Tränen der Petra von Kant)

(1972)

Petra, a wealthy fashion designer, lives with and relentlessly abuses her secretary/lover, Marlene. After meeting Karin, a lower-class, young woman, Petra is smitten and persuades her to move in. But soon Petra's love for Karin becomes obsessive and she loses the power over others that she once wielded so easily. Their affair ends abruptly when Karin returns to her husband, and Petra's life dissolves into drunkenness and destitution. Visually, the film is as rigorously controlled, even minimalist, as the script and performances are over-the-top, even campy. This is Fassbinder's portrait of love as sadomasochistic obsession, and freedom as the most frightening thing of all.

## PIONEERS IN INGOLSTADT (Pioniere in Ingolstadt)

(1970)

Fassbinder's version of Marie Luise Fleisser's play, tells the story of the transient love affairs between soldiers stationed in Ingolstadt and the local women, who view the affairs rather differently. While Alma is resigned to promiscuity, the naive servant Berta (brilliantly played by Hanna Schygulla) mistakenly believes that she has found a deep and lasting relationship with one of the soldiers. The film employs two quite different styles, as it fluctuates between Brechtian theatricality and a more fluid naturalism. ## THE AMERICAN SOLDIER (Der Amerikanische Soldat)

After returning to Munich, hard-drinking, hard-hearted German-American Vietnam War vet Ricky is hired by a group of sinister cops to commit a series of murders. Ricky undertakes his assignments with the same cool detachment that he brings to his love affair and a family reunion. Although his work as a hitman is lucrative, the ultimate payoff is deadly. ### THE NICKLASHAUSEN JOURNEY (Die Niklashauser fahrt)

A serious and deeply ironic film inspired by the real life of a fifteenth-century shepherd, Hans Böhm, who declared that the Virgin Mary had called him to become a revolutionary preacher. For a few months in 1476, Böhm led a large peasant uprising against the church and aristocracy to demand economic equality, whereupon he was arrested by the bishop's army and burned at the stake. A leather-jacketed Fassbinder plays the "Black Monk," a rather dubious follower of Böhm's. Often compared to Jean-Luc Godard's WEEKEND, the film freely mixes German history and references to contemporary political and anti-colonial struggles. Producer: Janus Film und Fernsehen. ### 7:30 p.m. KATZELMACHER

"Katzelmacher" is a Bavarian slur for a foreigner, particularly from the Mediterranean countries, who is thought to have an immense sexual appetite (and genitals to match). A chilling parable of latent middleclass fascism, the film focuses on a group of slackers in a dismal suburb of Munich. When the befuddled Greek immigrant worker Jorgos (played by Fassbinde himself) arrives, he disturbs their stupor and becomes the center of their dubious attention. Although the young women are attracted to him, the young men resent him. The result is the kind of scapegoating that has particular relevance for this country's current political climate.

## ALI: FEAR EATS THE SOUL (Angst essen Seele auf)

films was inspired by Douglas Sirk's ALL THAT HEAVEN ALLOWS. It tells the story of the "December-May" love affair between Emmi, a widowed German cleaning woman in her 60s, and Ali, a Moroccan immigrant worker more than 20 years her junior. The couple's decision to marry ignites the fears, snobbery and prejudices of Emmi's children and busybody neighbors. The outside pressures eventually subside, but the marriage soon falls prey to the partners' own fears and prejudices. The title character is played by Fassbinder's lover at the time, El Hedi Ben Salem. Fassbinder would later dedicate QUERELLE to him after learning of his

## **EFFI BRIEST** (Fontane Effi Briest)

Fassbinder's adaptation of Theodor Fontane's novel closely adheres to the nineteenth-century classic, while subtly manipulating its structure. Narrated by the filmmaker, it portrays the social and sexual victimization of Effi Briest, a young woman whose parents give her in marriage to a much older Prussian diplomat. After the couple moves to a remote Baltic port, the unhappy and lonely Effi falls into a fleeting liasion with her husband's friend. This dark comedy tells the story of Geesche, a Breme woman who was executed in 1831 for murdering fiftee people. Her crimes are committed as revenge on the people who have tried to control her life. ## THE THIRD GENERATION (Die Dritte Generation)

In this dark comedy, a band of ineffectual upper-middle class German terrorists deploy absurd tactics and spout equally absurd explanations of government oppression—despite their utter lack of ideological motivation. The group kidnaps a computer tycoon without realizing that he's set them up in order to increase the sales of his surveillance devices to the police. Made after the climax of left-wing terrorism and governmental crackdowns in 1978, the film directly addresses the troubled political conditions in West Germany, linking the rise of terrorism to capitalism and the collusion between capitalist management and the police.

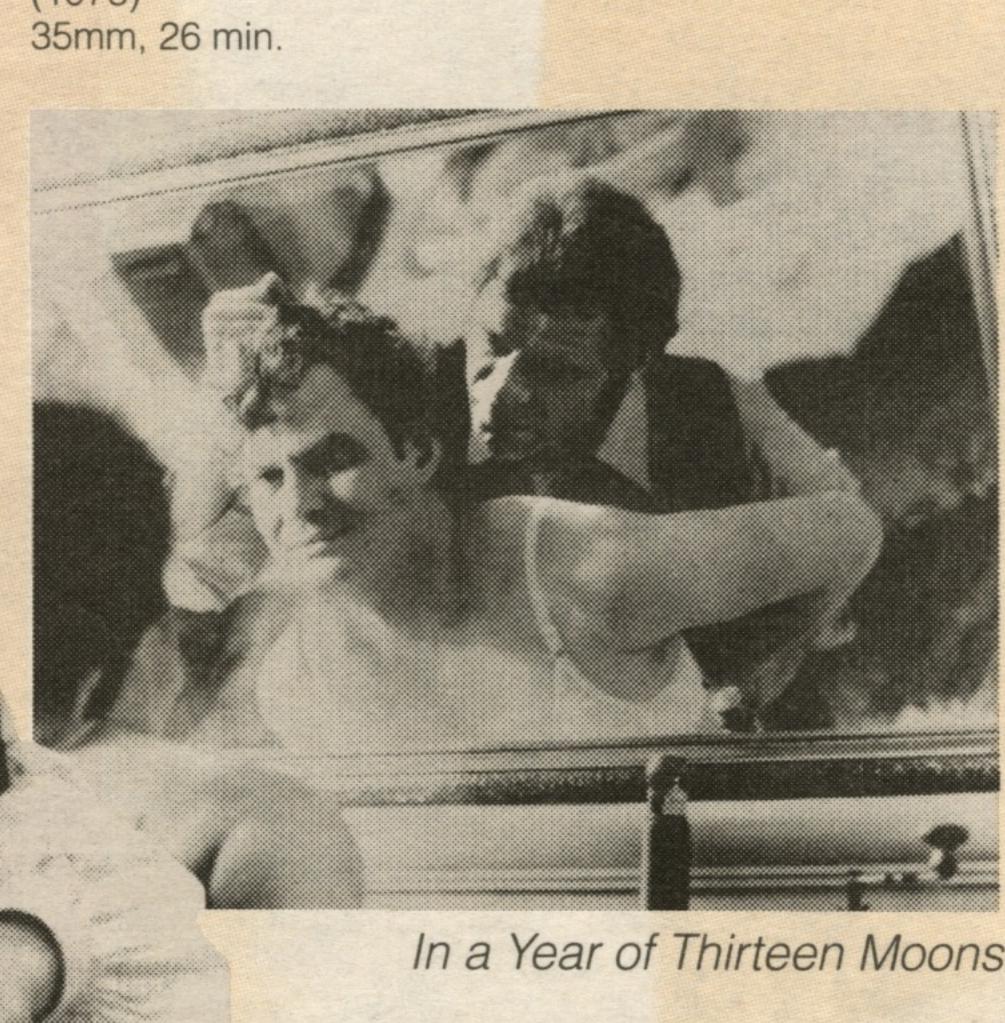

## MOTHER KUSTERS **GOES TO HEAVEN** (Mutter Küsters Fahrt zum Himmel)

The naive and simple Mother Küsters is exploited by the Left, the Right, her own family, and ultimately by the media after her factory-worker husband kills a foreman and commits suicide to protest the possibility of losing his job. On a mission to clear his name and give mean ing to the apparently senseless murder-suicide, Mother Küsters turns to the Communists for help, but they use the tragedy and its notoriety for their own seamy and selfish purposes. The film caused many on the German left to repudiate Fassbinder, just as many feminists and gay activists already had. The film traces its history via a fictional character, the third-rate cabaret singer Willie, who becomes a superstar when her recording is a smash hit. Her fame gives her access to Nazi authorities, connections that she tries to use to aid the resistance and her Jewish lover, but the regime proves difficult to outmaneuver. Made with a big budget due to the fame of Hanna Schygulla and Fassbinder after THE MARRIAGE OF MARIA BRAUN, the film includes large-scale battle scenes and climaxes with a huge propaganda spectacle, complete with swastikas, fireworks and flowers. THE STATIONMASTER'S WIFE This delightfully perverse story of a beautiful woman's affairs and sexual manipulation of her husband is set

## LOVE IS COLDER THAN DEATH (Liebe ist kälter als der Tod)

A crime syndicate wants the newly-released convict Franz, played by Fassbinder, to work for it. The handsome young Bruno is sent to persuade Franz, but the two thieves become friends. Indeed, Franz is so enamored with Bruno that he offers him the sexual favors of his girlfriend, the prostitute Hanna. But Hanna believes their relationship jeopardizes hers, so she makes other, more deadly plans for the two men. The possessiveness and jealousy within the triangle illustrate Fassbinder's point that gangsters are just as bourgeois as the system whose laws they exploit. The film is dedicated to Eric Rohmer, Claude Chabrol, Jean-Marie Straub, and QUIÉN SABE?, the spaghetti western which inspired Fassbinder to make this. his first feature.

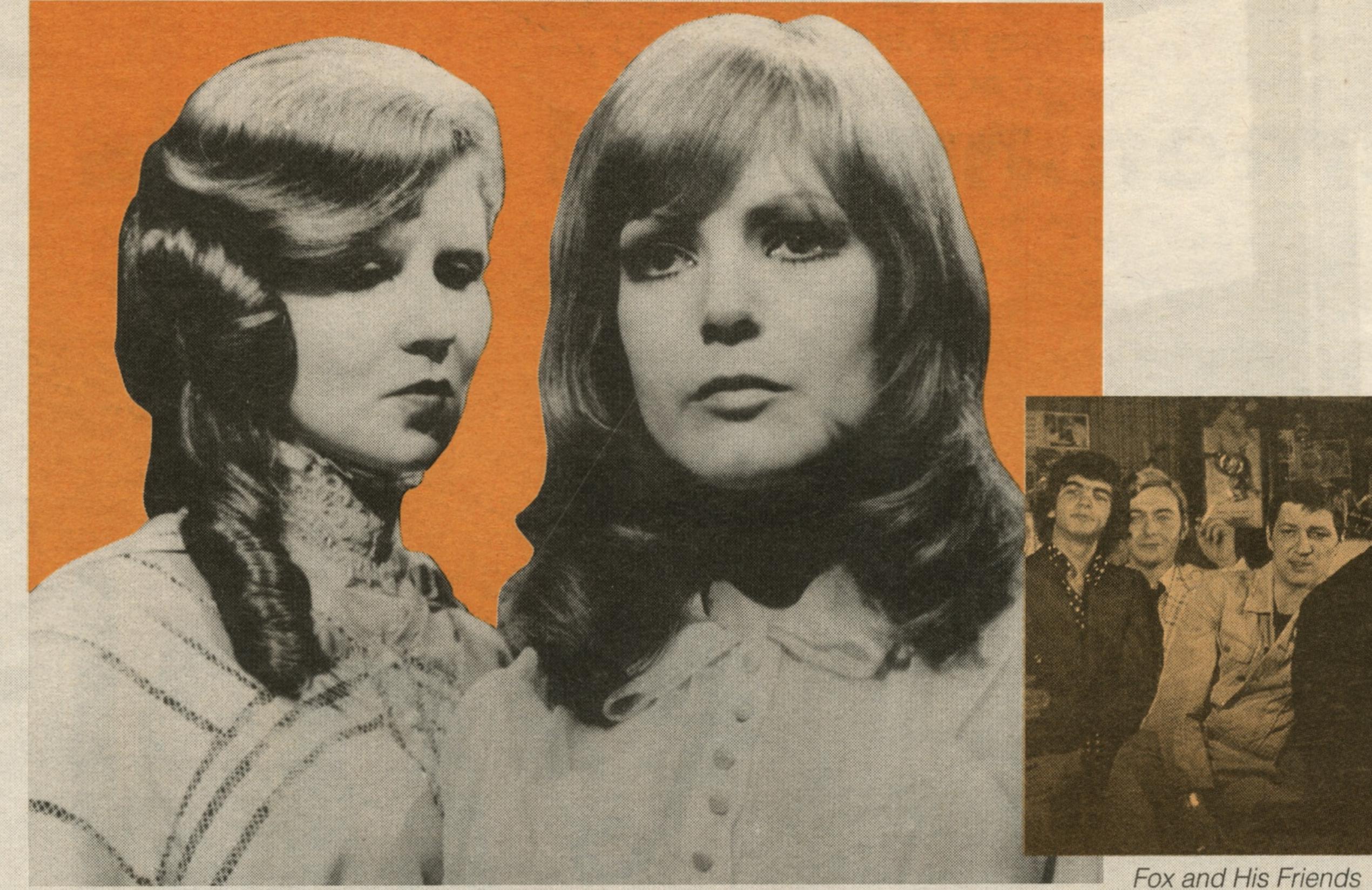

## **NORA HELMER**

In Fassbinder's version of Ibsen's play "A Doll's House," Nora Helmer saves her family from financial ruin, whereupon her troubles begin. Ignoring the typical Ibsen naturalism, Fassbinder flagrantly exaggerates the decor of late nineteenth-century middle-class domesticity, which provides a sharp and meaningful contrast with the actors' stiff, deliberate and carefully choreographed performances. "Nora is not someone who finally 'sees the light'. At the end, she's as stupid as she always was. A chemist prescribes Valium and she has a brief fling with him. But the drugs and her increasing drinking precipitate a breakdown, after which Margot finds that recovery isn't very much of an improvement. It tells the story of Dr. Fred Stiller, a cybernetics researcher who hopes to create artificial intelligence, but who learns that the world in which he lives is a computer projection that has displaced reality. Dr. Stiller's knowledge poses a severe threat to the political, corporate and legal powers, and they pursue him relentlessly, until a young woman with powers of her own comes to his rescue. WORLD ON A WIRE is perhaps the best example of the "aesthetics of hope" that Fassbinder claimed characterized his work for television, as opposed to the "aesthetics of pessimism" of his theatrical films. This "male melodrama" set in a gay milieu tells the story of a naive and trusting man ruthlessly manipulated by his friends. Fassbinder is quietly compelling as the carnival-worker protagonist Franz Biberkopf. After separating from his carnival-barker lover, Franz is picked up by a wealthy antique dealer, Max. When Franz wins the state lottery. Max's brittle and affluent friends are attracted to him despite his crude, working-class style. Captivated by the handsome sophisticate Eugen, Franz moves in with him, whereupon his lottery money is squandered to enrich Eugen's family and friends. The film is dedicated to Armin Meier, Fassbinder's third and last great love, and it eerily foretells Meier's own

Social pressures propel him to a crazy, violent reaction. This simple and personal film is one of the most straightforward examples of the Fassbinderian protagonist driven to desperation by an uncaring world.
