STORY:

Rainer Werner Fassbinder's most recent work, LILI MARLEEN, starring Hanna Schygulla, Giancarlo Giannini, and Mel Ferrer, captures the sensual, cynical atmosphere of Nazi-era Germany in a fictional tale woven around the legendary song beloved by both the Allies and the Axis during World War II.

In Fassbinder's adaptation of the autobiography, "Heaven Has Many Colors," by the late German chanteuse, Lale Anderson, Hanna Schygulla portrays Willie, a struggling, second-rate, singer-tap dancer working in Zurich and involved with an aspiring composer-conductor (Giancarlo Giannini) whose father (Mel Ferrer) is a wealthy Swiss Jew, engaged in spiriting Jews out of Germany.

Considering the relationship dangerous, the father prevents Willie from re-entering Switzerland while she is on a trip to Germany. She then turns for help to Nazi officer (Karl Heinz von Hassel), who arranges for her to record "Lili Marleen" which becomes an immediate hit when accidentally played on the German military radio network. (Actually, "Lili Marleen" was written as a poem during World War I by Hans Leip and set to music in the '20s by Norbert Schultze.) Hitler falls in love with it and Willie becomes an overnight star.

COMMENT:

"LILI MARLEEN" would have made one hell of a Hollywood musical in the '40s...it is a movie with a fantastic plot and a very rich and energetic mise-en-scene. The feelings Fassbinder expresses in LILI MARLEEN are sweeter and more passionate than any he has expressed before." --Andrew Sarris, Village Voice
