T (33-1) 5659-2320 F (33-1) 5659-2310 Christophe Gans returns to Midnight Madness with an impressive follow up to his cult success *Crying Freeman*. As usual, he refuses to pull any punches in his fascinating period-piece horror film *Le Pacte des loups*. In fact, Gans – who is heavily influenced by European and Hong Kong masters including Chang Cheh, Lau Kar Leung, John Woo, Mario Bava and Dario Argento – has pumped the film full of masterfully orchestrated martial arts scenes. The all-star cast features blockbuster performances from Samuel Le Bihan, Marc Dacasos, Jérémie Rénier, Emilie Dequenne, Monica Bellucci and the brooding Vincent Cassel.

A gigantic success in France, Le Pacte des loups adapts the myth of La Bête du Gévaudan, an allegedly true tale about a beast that terrorized the mountainous region of France from 1764 to 1767, reportedly killing more than a hundred people. Grégoire de Fronsac (the classically chivalrous Le Bihan) is a naturalist and decorated ex-soldier from the war in New France (Québec). He has been sent by Louis XV to study the beast, which most believe is a huge wolf, and to dispel the rumours of its supernatural origin. Fronsac arrives with a stoic, mysterious companion: Mani (played with ardour by Dacasos) is his Mohawk-Iroquois blood-brother whom he met in the war.

While taking part in mass hunts, examining the evidence and trying to solve the mystery, Fronsac finds himself drawn into the deadly intrigues and rivalries of the court and village. He is also caught between

two women – the stunning noblewoman Marianne de Morangias (Dequenne) and the disarmingly seductive Sylvia (Bellucci), who appeals to his dark side.

Gans's enthralling plot ultimately reveals the answer to a clever hypothesis: Could the whole thing be an insidious conspiracy or is the beast truly a medieval monster that Renaissance science cannot explain? *Le Pacte* is edited by David Wu, the man responsible for all of John Woo's Hong Kong films, as well as *Crying Freeman* and Ronny Yu's quintessential *The Bride with White Hair*. With head-spinning cinematography and rule-breaking fight scenes, Gans's genre-bending take on Renaissance-era France thrills, frightens and surprises from beginning to end.
