

Thus it is that the forthcoming film will have all the elements of the great Broadway attraction. The gifted Tennessee Williams penned a touching, yet powerful work in "A Streetcar Named Desire." The story of a southern "gentlewoman" whose life takes a downward direction as the family estate falls off to nothing, it tells how she flees her home town to come and live with her sister in New Orleans. The sister, a normal young woman who has thrown off the dreamy memories of the past, is married to a muscular young man, who though beneath her former station perhaps, gives her happiness, nonetheless. But Blanche, attempting to hold onto her unreal earlier days, provokes her brother-in-law into searching out and revealing her more immediate past, leading to the climax.

Vivien Leigh, who created the role of Scarlett in the fabulous "Gone With the Wind," played the role of Blanche in the London production for nine months. As one of England's outstanding actresses, her reputation assured producers of a top performance. In Marlon Brando, creator of the Broadway role of the brutish Stanley Kowalski, was another assurance. Kim Hunter as Stella, the sister, Karl Malden as Mitch, the suitor, Rudy Bond, Nick Dennis, Peg Hillias and Richard Garrick also repeat their original roles.

'Streetcar Named Desire' Due

Richard Day, an Academy Award winner five times for his distinguished art direction, describes his settings for "A Streetcar Named Desire" as "dramatized realism."

With New Orleans and the picturesque French Quarter as background for the taut emotional action of Tennessee Williams' celebrated stage success, the film will be shown on the starting, with Vivien Leigh and Marlon Brando. It is an Elia Kazan production, produced by Charles K. Feldman for Warner Bros. Kazan directed. Day spent some weeks in the Louisiana city absorbing atmosphere and acquiring material.

"My whole basis of design was to create backgrounds that work and prev on the character of Blanche DuBois, the central figure of the story, which Vivien Leigh portrays," Day continued. "These settings had to tear and eat away at Blanche's nerves and play their part in her final disintegration.

"When she comes to visit her sister Stella and Stella's husband, played by Kim Hunter and Marlon Brando, the shock of what she sees in contrast to her neatness, her gentleness and her feeling for dwelling in the grandeur of the past had to be emphatically depicted. "And so we have Stella and

Stanley's place. One hundred and fifty years ago in the city that was, it was a mansion, with its beautiful doors, splendid old mantelpiece, and refined architectural detail. Today, it has degenerated to a slum, with stain and carelessness and disregard, the warp of time and the functional use of modern progress having taken their toll. Blanche's horror is immediately apparent and this flat continues to work on her emotions, even though she makes some effort to restore and clean it up."


"Doubly fortunate for me that I was chosen for the motion picture version and that I was free to accept," she said. "This is my first American-made picture in some years and I couldn't be more thrilled.

Miss Leigh added that she will never forget that other Southern lady in her gallery of characterizations - fiery Scarlett O'Hara in "Gone With The Wind," from Margaret Mitchell's classic.

"When the search was on for the lucky girl to bring Scarlett to life, I never thought the final choice would be me," she remarked. "Which is why I love the acting profession so much. You never know what's going to happen to you in it or what it's going to bring to you. Lucky me! I not only became Scarlett but I became Blanche, as well."

Great Talents Pooled for 'Streetcar' Film

Of all the personalities developed by the famed Group Theatre in New York none are perhaps more grateful than Tennessee Williams and Elia Kazan. It was the Theatre's awarding Williams a money prize for his one-act plays which brought him to New York and a subsequent Pulitzer Prize for "A Streetcar Named Desire." Kazan, beginning as an errand boy there, learned much of the stage-craft and teaching that has made him one of the foremost directors of stage and screen today.

So it was that the creative skill of Mr. Williams and the directorial genius of "Gadge" Kazan, brought "A Streetcar Named Desire" to Broadway audiences and on to international fame. Then, when Hollywood beckoned for the filmization of the stage hit, the talented team travelled to the Coast to fashion a celluloid version. With them came the original Broadway



Marlon Brando Hitch-Hiked to Stardom

When Marlon Brando hit the road one day to hitch-hike from New York to Cape Cod to read for author Tennessee Williams, a headline career was launched that was never to be more outdone than by the manner in which he made the trip.

Brando got the part-it was the key role in "A Streetcar Named Desire," the play that was later to rock Broadway, win the Pulitzer Prize and the New York Drama Critics' Award. Now it has been made into a motion picture, and Brando again plays the role of Kowalski.

Marlon Brando, young, goodlooking and independent, left Libertyville, Illinois, seven years ago to try his hand at acting in New York. He studied at a dramatic school and then, after one season in a Sayville, Long Island stock company, landed a few minor roles on Broadway.

turization of Tennessee Williams' Pulitzer Prize winning success, he immediately sought the services of the actors who had helped establish the play as one of the great dramas in modern theatre.

Brando, the talented young performer who had risen to fame for his performance of the brutish Stanley Kowalski, recreates the role on screen. Kim Hunter and Karl Malden, also featured on Broadway, are seen in their original characterizations.

As for the balance of the cast, there's Rudy Bond, Peg Hillias, Nick Dennis, Wright King, Richard Garrick and Ann Dere -all from Broadway.

Played it in London

Miss Leigh, however, is no stranger to the exacting emotional role of Blanche DuBois. the heroine of "A Streetcar Named Desire."

She created the show on the London stage, starring in it for nine months, before heading for Hollywood for the screen version -her biggest role since she played the memorable Scarlett in "Gone With The Wind." An Elia Kazan production, produced by Charles K. Feldman for Warners, "A Streetcar Named Desire" is another in the list of famed stage plays made into films Playwright Williams wrote the screenplay.

memorable trip to see author Tennessee Williams, and a new star was on his way. Brando is known on Broadway and in Hollywood as anything from a rugged individual to an eccentric, for he failed to conform from the very beginning with the accepted conception of a theatrical star. For one thing Brando is unimpressed with the glitter of both theatrical capitals and to this day lives in a glamorless walkup, wears loafers and T-shirts, and eats in cafeterias. Marlon simply explains it by saving he's just more comfortable without a necktie. Who's eccentric now?

He won't sign any long-term Hollywood contracts. He'll do a picture, sure, but only when the part interests him. Thus it was that he plaved the paraplegic veteran in "The Men" produced by Stanley Kramer, a man for whom the actor has great respect. Brando still goes to dramatic school in New York and continues to study at his "trade." much like any other intelligent craftsman or professional.

Play-into-Film

Two years ago when Charles K. Feldman in consultation with Jack L. Warner, took steps to produce "A Streetcar Named Desire" for Warners, it followed that author Williams and the original stager Elia Kazan should be at the helm again, also that these two should try to retain as many members of the original cast as possible. Kim Hunter, Karl Malden, Rudy Bond, Peg Hillias and Nick Dennis duplicate their stage roles, while Vivien Leigh, summoned from London where she portrayed the leading female role in "Streetcar" for almost a year, resumes the characterization in the screen version. 








Gary, Indiana Steeler Now Film Actor


