In the early 1980's, the UN High Commission predicted that by the year 2000, the problem of ''refugeeism'' would reach staggering proportions. I've programmed the following two films, *So Far from India* and *Falasha* with this in mind. I also find them artful and excellent reflections on a problem which grows geometrically each year, and involves millions of the homeless and the displaced.

Miss Nair is an Indian filmmaker living in New York. Her award winning first film, Jama Masjid Street Journal, was broadcast on public television in America and India. So Far from India employs a documentary style to tell a story about America. A young Indian moves to New York, ostensibly to raise enough money to send for his wife and young son. But in America he catches a glimpse of a different way of life, of hugely different possibilities, and gradually he's seduced by it. When he goes
