Discovered unheralded in a modest Cannes market screening, Menzel's new film provoked the most mirth heard at the festival this year, followed by a rarely-heard ovation. Without a doubt the director's best since his 1968 Capricious Summer, it features a gallery of hicks whose exploits range from Feydeauesque adultery to the good-hearted final rallying around the village idiot, whom property developers are conspiring to dispatch to a tower block in town. Yet it is not the plot which makes the film. Rather it is the tone of affectionate irony: the earnest way the villagers discuss the recent advent there of Western bra-less-ness; their enthusiasm for American action films (shown nightly on TV preceded by the identical, solemn warning that they 'mirror a bourgeois society dedicated to the power of the dollar'); and Menzel's favourite actor, crinkle-faced Rudolf Hrušínský as an accident-prone doctor whose high success rate owes more to an unquenchable desire to help than to his entirely unproven medical expertise.—Clare Kitson.
