

Synopsis

Senator Melvin Ashton (William Powell) thinks he's Presidential timber and embarks upon a campaign to gain the nomination. He is aided and abetted by Lew Gibson (Peter Lind Hayes), a political press agent.

The party boss, Houlihan (Ray Collins), is helpless to stop the Senator's Presidential aspirations when the latter explains he possesses a diary exposing party machinations.

Poppy McNaughton (Ella Raines), a young newspaper woman and Gibson's girl friend, seeks to explode Ashton's ambitions by ridiculing his campaign in her paper.

Meanwhile, the Senator, who publicly disclaims being a candidate, nevertheless tours the country on a platform which includes among numerous ridiculous promises a guarantee that every man, woman and child in the nation will enjoy a normal temperature. He comes out violently against both inflation and deflation and backs "flation." To labor he promises a two-day week with eight days pay; to capital he promises to keep labor working an eight-day week with two days pay. The President-bound Senator poses with babies; he's seen in the cab of a locomotive in engineer's garb, and does many other things generally associated satirically with Presidential aspirants.

Valerie Shepherd(Arleen Whelan), from out of town, meets the Senator and takes advantage of his naivete to steal the diary, acting for her fiance, a legislator opposing Ashton.

Poppy and Lew recover the diary when Valerie attempts suddenly to leave the city, changing hysteria to joy among Ashton and his henchmen. But Lew, who cheated Poppy out of a scoop when he kept the Diary from her, finds he can't live with his conscience and steals back the valuable record book.

The resulting expose forces the Senator to quit the country.
