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LA DOLCE VITA defined "decadence" for a generation with its widescreen, epic vision of Rome at the height of the postwar Italian economic miracle. ("The Rome I speak of," said Fellini, "is a city of the inner self; its topography is entirely spiritual.") Marcello Mastroianni plays a writer turned gossip columnist who drifts from party to party, a detached observer of the Eternal City's frenzy of false miracles, promiscuous sex and paparazzi culture. Clinging to the promise of "the sweet life" to keep himself from collapsing into despair, the writer is so utterly self-absorbed that he does not register the pain of those around him. Fellini's panorama of "la dolce vita" opens with a hilariously profane image – a statue of Jesus suspended from a helicopter on its way to the Vatican ("Oh, look, there's Jesus!" a woman exclaims, as if she had just sighted a telenovella star) – and offers as its signature sequence Anita Ekberg anointing her ample self in the Trevi Fountain.
