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



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

In Sworn to the Drum, Les Blank explores the life and music of legendary Afro-Cuban drummer Francisco Aguabella. Best known outside the Cuban community for his secular conga drumming, National Heritage Award winner Aguabella is also a master drummer of the batá, the sacred drum used in Cuban Santería ceremonies. Blank's film covers both Aguabella's professional life with the greats of contemporary music - he's played with Tito Puente, Eddie Palmieri, Paul Simon, Peggy Lee and even Frank Sinatra - and his private world as a *tambolero*, or sacred drummer.

Rather than deserting his cultural traditions for the American dream of popular success,

Aguabella has made serving his community a priority. Through the film, we see that a rich, rewarding life can straddle two realities: sacred/ secular, traditional/ popular. For Aguabella, this makes an integrated life. Students struggling with issues of identity should respond to the film.



Mardi Gras in the neighborhoods

Always for Pleasure

Always For Pleasure documents the neighborhood revelry of New Orleans, where 175 parade permits are issued a year. The film ignores the famous Mardi Gras of the elite for the downhome neighborhood celebrations, including St. Patrick's Day and St. Joseph's Day. Much of the film focuses on the African-American 'Indian' tribes, whose annual Mardi Gras and other parades pay homage to the Louisiana Indians who harbored escaped slaves. African, French, Spanish, and Caribbean elements are blended in

the tribes' ritualized costumes, songs, dances, verbal sparring, boasting, and humor. The film emphasizes how the community is bound together by this created ritual and celebration; it's an excellent portrait of communities within a city.


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


America's Polynesian heritage

Puamana draws the viewer into the world of Auntie Irmgard Farden Aluli, one of Hawaii's best loved musicians and composers. Auntie Irmgard's life and music are framed by the core values of Native Hawaiian culture: *aloha* (spiritual love), ohana (family) and love of the land. She and her family struggle to maintain traditional cultural values in a complex world. Shot on Maui and Oahu, the film features Auntie Irmgard performing with her niece and two daughters in the musical group Puamana, telling stories of the musical Farden family, discussing her song-writing inspirations, and includes a section on her sister, hula master Auntie Emma Farden Sharpe. The viewer comes away with an appreciation of the richness of Native Hawaiian life, and of the challenges facing Hawaii today.

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
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
The transformation of pain into art

The Blues Accordin' to Lightnin' Hopkins

Lightnin' Hopkins was one of America's greatest bluesmen. Born in Texas, he hit the road at age ten, and intimately knew the hard times that his blues celebrate and lament. Les Blank's film captures Hopkins' blues in their fullest, darkest power. Blank's poetic camera and editing do more to explain the roots of country blues than a hundred scholars could.


Perhaps the film's most moving scene shows Hopkins improvising after his wife has left him. The power of this great artist – and of the African-American tradition – to transform pain into art transfixes the viewer in Blank's intimate portrait. This film is a must for any course on American music or African-American studies.

The soaring Norteña music of the Texas-Mexico border serves as a metaphor for understanding identity and experience. *Chulas Fronteras* features Lydia Mendoza, Flaco Jiménez, Los Alegres de Teran, Narciso Martínez, and others, whose music embodies the traditions, values and beliefs of the people. The film does not overlook life's hardships, particularly the Chicano experience of seasonal migration to work in the fields. Music, politics and life are integrated in this film in a way that is both enchanting and unset-

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

In addition to scenes of Clifton belting it out at sweaty dance halls, the film takes us into the bayous and byways of southwestern Louisiana (some of Blank's most stunning photography) and into the streets and homes of Chenier's people.
